Executive summary

To commemorate the 500th birth anniversary of Guru Nanak Dev Ji, the founder of Sikh Religion, some visionary, philanthropic persons of the town realized that starting a higher education institute for girls would be a befitting tribute to the Guru as it would help in realizing his concept of egalitarian society by empowering the women folk of this remote and backward area. The idea got materialized when the then Chief Minister of Punjab S. Parkash Singh Badal gave his consent to be the President of the 'Guru Nanak Education Society' that founded 'Guru Nanak College for Girls', Christened after the name of the Guru.

In 1970, the college was started with one academic programme i.e. B.A., affiliated to Panjab University, Chandigarh which was established in 1882 as University of Panjab at Lahore (now in Pakistan). In the year 2000, the college was undertaken by the Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC), Sri Amritsar which was founded in 1925 and at present is running 72 schools, 39 colleges and 1 University having a budgetary provisions of 1064 crores.

Beginning with single faculty, the institute is now offering courses in Science, Commerce, Arts and Computers faculty. It includes 8 UG, 7 PG, 1 PG Diploma, 4 Dual degree and 8 Short Term Courses. For academic flexibility the institute is providing 16 elective subjects and 89 subject combinations in humanities course. To inculcate the moral and ethical values in the students, the institute is offering a value added course 'Sikh Dharam Adhyian Pattar Vihar Course' run by Dharam Parchar Committee of SGPC. Based on this exam, scholarships are provided to the meritorious students.

To accomplish the idea of girs' education, a transparent admission process is adopted admitting students from SC/OBC/Minority and disadvantaged sections. For effective implementation of curriculum, academic calendar is followed and teaching plans are prepared accordingly. Besides using the conventional teaching methods like chalk and talk, discussions, models, charts, project based learning, field trips, new methods and

techniques like power point presentations, video lectures of e-pgpathshala and NPTEL are also used. The culture of independent learning is promoted in students by inculcating the habit of using e-journals, e-books and other web sources. Interactive learning is also focused through regular industry trips and field trips. Expertise of subject experts as well as industry experts is taken as source of collaborative learning by inviting them to seminars, workshops and guest lectures.

Innovative teaching learning methods are regularly used for nourishing creativity and talent of the students by organizing variety of events. Fashion designing department organize fashion show in which garments and accessories designed by students are show cased; Department of English takes the initiative to supplement its teaching techniques the syllabus content by showing movies based on literary works and 'dramas' enacted by students. Competitions in poster making, model making and paper presentation are organized by science department.

Core of teaching-learning process is quality of teachers. The institute has 43 regular, 33 ad hoc and 5 contractual teachers. The faculty is well qualified with 16 Ph.D., 27 M.Phil. and 19 NET qualified members. The institute believes in continual growth in quality of faculty and their empowerment, indicative of this is the fact that 10 faculty members are pursuing Ph. D. at present

Every year excellent results are achieved, majority of the courses came out with 100% results including 39 university positions in the period from 2012-2016. These figures are evidence of continuous internal and external monitoring as well as formative and summative evaluation of the students.

To promote research and academic development of the faculty, financial assistance, infrastructural facilities and duty leaves, are provided by the management. Faculty is involved in research activities by receiving grants from government agencies for projects, seminars/conferences. Forty faculty members have undertaken faculty development programmes and a number of them has presented papers in conferences, workshops,

seminars and rendering their expertise as resource persons and subject experts in 'inspection teams' of the affiliating university.

Being aware of its social responsibility, the college plans and organizes its extension and outreach programmes through NCC, NSS, cells and clubs as well as through different departmental societies. Blood donation camps were organized. Every year NSS units and red ribbon club distribute flags for charity and NSS unit has also received a letter of appreciation from Sainik Welfare Board for its contribution. Efforts towards contribution to healthy environment include setting up of vermi composting unit in the campus, cycle rally for lesser pollution, "polythene free campus" campaign and cleaning of local parks. 'Pink Marathon' for women empowerment was organized in collaboration with the local administration. To sensitize the students and citizens regarding importance of Earth day, Environment day, Labour Day, Literacy day, Teachers day, voters day are celebrated in the campus.

The institute is sprawled over an area of 14.8 acres. It has six blocks comprising of 46 classrooms, 20 laboratories, 3 smart class rooms, Seminar hall, Botanical garden, department offices and spaces for different units/cells. One administrative block houses Principal's office, LMC meeting hall, accounts office, establishment branch, and offices of Bursar, Dean, Academics, Registrar, House examinations, IQAC office and Staff room, Rest rooms. Sports facilities include 400 m track, courts for volley ball, kho kho, badminton, hand ball, hockey, foot ball and kabaddi for outdoor games and a big hall for Indoor games like Taek Won do, judo, table tennis, boxing, kabaddi (national style) and gymnasium. There are 2 open air stages to carry out co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

The institute has 6 guest rooms, faculty house for outstation women teachers, girls' hostel and accommodation facility for support staff. Other facilities like *Gurdwara* sahib, Shopping complex with 9 shops, Cafeteria, three parking spaces, ten lawns laid with

benches, three silent generators, six RO systems with a capacity of 2500 liters potable water as the ground water of the region is not fit for human consumption, are installed.

Library and IT facilities of the institute are important resources to support the academics. College has a fully air conditioned Library with 24500 books, and subscription of 33 journals, 28 magazines and 13 newspapers. Library has subscription to INFLIBNET, too, which provides access to 6000 e-journals and 31 lakh e-books. There are three separate reading rooms, one for faculty and two for students. Facilities like Internet, reprographic, computerized catalogue, and wash room are available in it. IT facilities include 215 computers, 2 Wi-Fi connections, 4 computer labs, 1 language and communication lab along with adequate computer accessories.

The institute commits support to students and their progression during their stint in the college. Complete information of student support is supplied in the prospectus. Functioning of Dean, students' welfare ensures that all the efforts of Center government, State government and other National agencies are maximally harnessed to assist the students of different class, economic status, abilities and religion to provide them equal opportunity of education, which is a prerequisite of egalitarian society. In this light, scholarships of Rs. 2,24,90,349/- to BC, Minority, Physically disabled and meritorious students and freeships of Rs. 1,11,05,684/- to SC students have been made available under different schemes, to the tune of Rs. 3,35,96,033.

To achieve its mission and thus the vision, under the working of Dean, students' welfare, the institute is trying to follow the footprints of government agencies and has provided Fee concession/ freeships of Rs. 1,18,22,918/-, hostel fee concession of Rs. 3,40,050/-, annual cash prizes of Rs. 1,15,800/- and religious exam scholarships of Rs. 34100/- to needy or meritorious students, amounting to Rs. 1,23,12,868/-.

Financial assistance of Rs. 4,59,08,901/- has been provided to benefit about 50.57% students on an average in the last four years. In the session 2015-2016 alone, more than

half of the students admitted in the college, i.e. 65.58% have received financial assistance.

Keeping in mind, the all-round development of students, their participation in various competitions has been facilitated by the institute by provision of TA/DA, reimbursement of registration fee, sports kits, special diet/ meal for sports students. Under the monitoring of Dean, Sports, an amount of Rs. 1,56,76,133/- has been spent in thelast four years to promote sports. This includes freeships of amount Rs. 57,96,512/- given to 653 sports persons in the last four years. To avoid any loss in studies due to participation in competitions, remedial classes are arranged and flexibility is given in house examinations.

To prepare students for different competitive examinations a 'Coaching center for competitive examinations' is functioning in the campus. Resultantly, 27 students have qualified UGC-NET, 36 qualified TET/CTET/PTET, 7 students qualified banking examinations, 7 students cleared SSB exams whereas 12 students got selected in Punjab police. Other facilities offered to students include counseling services through career guidance cell and tutors. Institute has strong mentoring system, 1 tutor is assigned to mentor a group of 40 students. Grievance redressal cell, Anti-sexual harassment cell, Anti-ragging cell works for creating peaceful and healthy environment in the campus.

All the above mentioned institutional processes have come out from the light of mission which, in turn, is the aim to achieve the vision stated by founders of the institute. To achieve the mission, governance of the college has a four-tier structure, comprising of the Top management SGPC; Education Committee and Directorate of Education; Local Managing Committee and the Principal. The two-tier quality assurance system comprises of Deans and IQAC; Heads of departments and In charges, committees with student council as its important component.

All the members involved in governance and quality assurance process play their part in formulation and amendment of policies of the institute following "Bottom to Top"

approach following budgetary provisions. Once the policy is developed, suitable strategies/ action plans are prepared. Well defined duties are allotted to each and every individual with idea of 'Authority with responsibility' and decentralized governance for better implementation of policies and plans. This promotes the ambience of participative management in the institute where decision making is a collaborative process with varied level of participation.

Institute has established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell with a view to improve the quality of the institute in all respects. Quality assurance is ensured by formulation of aims and objectives, proper monitoring of activities carried out to achieve stated aims, reviewing the process after completion of task and feedback from various stakeholders.

Along with imparting formal quality education, the institution is striving hard to keep its cultural heritage alive so as to keep the students rooted in their soil while living in harmony not only with the humankind but also with Nature. Through various activities, the students are apprised with the tangible and intangible aspects of their culture. Further, the nature-friendly campus of the college motivates them towards green living.

- University rank holders, sports personals of university/inter-university/national repute, job oriented and socially enlightened students.
- Value oriented education through course, processes, and traditions to make good citizens aware of challenges in their lives.

Weaknesses:

- Situated in a relatively remote and backward region that falls in semi arid zone.
- Social constraints and lack of awareness among the people of the region hindering the growth of the girl students.
- State government's policy of ban on recruitment of grant-in-aid posts puts financial burden on the institute.

- Curriculum of all the UG, PG programmes is designed by the affiliating university.
- A few Collaborations/linkages with different agencies for research and extension activities.

Opportunities:

- Scope of introduction of skill based programmes to catering the global needs leading to start ups.
- Research facilities can be improved by collaborating with national, international agencies.
- Linkages to Industries/Corporate can be increased through signing formal MOUs/agreements.

Challenges:

- To imbue students with rich cultural traditions and their retention in the fast changing world and at the same time preparing them to face the global challenges.
- To update/upgrade curriculum, teaching learning methods and techniques and keeping the faculty abreast of new trends in higher education.

CRITERION- I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 CURRICULUM PLANNING AND IMPLEMENTATION

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

VISION

MISSION

To shape young minds through diverse knowledge and skill development programmes and inculcate in them human values, the ideals of social justice and peaceful co-existence, in harmony with Nature and humankind to achieve Guru Nanak's vision of egalitarian society.

OBJECTIVES:

- To promote the socio-economic, cultural, ethical, and scientific consciousness among the students and to enhance their critical and reflective thinking.
- To foster the local needs of the community.
- To promote women's active participation in the society.

COMMUNICATION: The vision, mission and objectives of the institution are vividly stated in the college prospectus and displayed in the college campus. Besides, at the

commencement of every academic session the new entrants are apprised of the same through leaflets and special orientation sessions. At the start of each academic year there are two orientation sessions: for students and staff each. The former comprises of introduction to the faculty, staff, stakeholders, curriculum, hostel, library, rules and regulations, vision, mission and objectives of the institution. The latter comprises of an introduction to individual responsibilities, administrative roles and duties of the staff in light of vision, mission and objectives of the institution.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum are developed through teaching plans and time table formulation. Teaching plan is prepared at department level by its faculty members at the beginning of each academic session. Framing of time table is done by the head of each department and approved by Dean, Academic Affairs. It ensures effective implementation of curriculum. The departmental meetings of HOD with faculty members are carried out whereas the meetings of all the teachers in a department with the Principal, and Dean, Academic Affairs are conducted twice a year. Curriculum coverage and its implementation are monitored by the Dean through regular feedback from HODs throughout the session.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The curriculum for each course is prescribed by the affiliating university and an academic calendar for its planned implementation is issued. In addition, the university also deputes resource persons for organizing workshops, seminars, conferences for making students acquainted with latest research and methodologies. The college provides very good academic environment for effective teaching learning process. The institution also

inspects laboratories, library and teaching learning practices along with curriculum implementation. Projectors are provided for smart teaching. Apart from classroom teaching, it also conducts various training programmes, workshops, seminars, extension lectures, field visits to supplement teaching learning process. The Institution also encourages and facilitates the teaching faculty to present their research work at various levels i.e. university, national and international level.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

For effective curriculum delivery, faculty members of each department design a teaching plan and curriculum is covered accordingly. This is further checked by Dean, Academics Affairs and the Principal. Projector facility provided by the institution also helps in effective understanding of curriculum through video lectures, presentations, animations. In addition to the prescribed curriculum, extension lectures on advances in respective fields help in making curriculum delivery more effective. Periodical assessment is also carried out for various programmes by the institution in form of class tests, presentations etc. and examinations on regular intervals.

Institution also has subscription to INFLIBNET for access to various national and international e-journals and e-books.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

Institution networks and interacts with beneficiaries in effective operationalisation of curriculum through various departments as the students of BBA go for summer internship of 6-8 weeks in banks, business firms, industrial units every year to carry project works. Guest lectures are also organized inviting resource persons from industry, banking and food processing companies. Visits of students to the industries situated in the district are carried out. M.Com. students also undergo industrial training in summer vacation. Visits

of the students to industry are also carried out in addition to lectures by experts from University. Industrial training for students of B.Sc. and PGDFD (Fashion Designing) is also organized each year. Students are also sent to National Board for Higher Mathematics (NBHM) training programme every year. As a mandatory part of the curriculum, the students of B.Sc. (Biotechnology) go for training project of 4 weeks in different institutions. Similarly, other departments also conduct extension lectures by experts for effective operationlisation of curriculum.

1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.

The institution contributes indirectly in the development of the curriculum by the affiliating university through its staff members. Four Departments are represented on Board of Studies of the affiliating university. Student and teacher feedback is taken on regular basis and the same is conveyed to the university.

1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.

Keeping in mind the needs of local people, according to the demands of the market, to make the learner self dependent, skilled for market/self employment the institution has started certificate courses in Cooking and Baking, Food Preservation, Cutting and Stitching, Art and Craft, Printing and Dying, English Speaking, Basics of Computer and Internet, and Mathematics for Competitive examinations. The curriculum for these enrichment courses has been developed by the concerned departments.

1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

Institution analyzes that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in course of implementation through regular follow up. For this, there are regular meetings conducted in the respective departments by HODs. In addition to this, departmental meetings are conducted by Dean Academic Affairs, and the Principal. These meetings ensure effective and timely implementation of curriculum as well as they help in having an understanding that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved. Intra class competitions are also conducted by various departments to analyze the in-depth understanding of students. Department of Basic Sciences conducts NGPE (NATIONAL GRADUATE PHYSICS EXAMINATION, organized by IAPT) to analyze and ensure in-depth understanding of the subject in addition to exposure to competitive examinations. In addition to this, the results of individual faculty members and departments are also reviewed in order to analyze the accomplishment of stated objectives.

1.2 ACADEMIC FLEXIBILITY

With an aim to develop skill, make youth employment ready, promote them for higher education and research in their respective areas of interest various programmes are offered by the Institution. Yes, the institution offers Four Dual Degree Programmes;

Students can choose any of the courses with their main degree programmes. Certificate is awarded after completion of one year in the course, likewise Diploma is awarded after two years and Advanced Diploma is awarded after completion of three years, to the students.

Knowledge based courses help the students for progression in higher studies. Courses in Commerce, Business Administration and Fashion Designing expose students to market oriented activities thus further enhancing their chances of employability. The main aim of short term courses is skill development as per needs of society so they are designed and developed at fundamental level while keeping in mind their application in day to day life.

1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Yes, the institution offers the self financed programmes. 15 academic programmes and courses mentioned in 1.2.1 are self financed except B.A,

The self financed programmes are similar to financed ones in terms of admission, curriculum (prescribed by the University), fee structure (formulated by the Institution), teacher qualification and salary (as per UGC/State rules) except for enrichment courses (discussed in Section 1.1.7).

1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Yes, the college provides additional skill oriented courses in the form of Modular Courses, relevant to regional and global employment markets. These short term courses offered by the institution are as below:

- 1. Certificate Course in Cooking and Baking
- 2. Certificate Course in Food Preservation
- 3. Certificate Course in Cutting and Stitching
- 4. Certificate Course in Printing and Dying
- 5. Certificate Course in Art and Craft
- 6. Certificate Course in English Speaking
- 7. Certificate Course in Basics of Computer and Internet
- 8. Certificate Course in Mathematics for Competitive examinations.

These courses are run at institution level. From curriculum designing to evaluation the entire process is done by the faculty from the concerned department of the institution. Curriculum designing is done keeping in mind the local needs, the demands of market and to make the learners self dependent, skilled, ready for self employment. Since main aim of these courses is skill development so they are designed and developed at fundamental level while keeping in mind their application in day to day life. The fee structure of these courses is also designed such as to be easily affordable. Moreover, the short term courses offered are open to learners of all age groups.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

No, the university does not provide any flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and distance mode of education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice.

1.3 CURRICULUM ENRICHMENT

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

The institution frequently conducts extension lectures in various disciplines to ensure that the academic programmes and the institution's goals and objectives are integrated. Theme based tutorials are conducted periodically in the institution to acquaint students with goals and objectives and inculcate moral values and self discipline in them in addition to regular curriculum. Teaching content is also supplemented with video lectures, animations, data analysis and presentations from the internet to supplement the existing curriculum. Seminars, conferences and workshops are also conducted which supplement the university's curriculum and ensure that the academic programmes and institution's goals and objectives are integrated.

Apart from this, *Gurmat Sabha*, a separate cell is established in institution for promoting moral and ethical values among the students. It conducts a value added correspondence course and moral value examinations to inculcate moral and ethical values to achieve Guru Nanak Dev ji's vision of egalitarian society.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

In order to enrich and organize the curriculum, numerous activities are carried out by various departments of the institution throughout the year. These include field trips, industry visits, and training programmes. Guest lectures are organized by the institution regularly in which experts from universities, industry, banking, food processing units are invited. Visits of students to various industries situated in the district are carried out by the concerned departments.

Industrial training is also organized by some departments such as Commerce, Management, and Fashion Designing to keep the students abreast with the needs of the dynamic employment market. Department of Basic Sciences also conducts visits to botanical garden, fisheries, science city, and thermal plant to enhance the academic experiences of the students. Department of Fashion Designing conducts fashion shows and exhibitions of the various items designed by students, which provides a platform to students to showcase their talent in addition to the curriculum enrichment. Similarly, Department of Home Science also conducts workshops and competitions regarding baking, rakhi making, rangoli, and envelope making to enhance the experiences of students. Department of English goes for staging of the plays, and screening of films based on literary works included in the curriculum, along with the competitions in creative writing, and caption contests to elevate confidence level of students and for increasing the language proficiency.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

Efforts are made by the institution to integrate cross cutting issues into curriculum through various societies, clubs and associations as:

- 1) **Red Ribbon Club:** This program comes under youth welfare services. The main aim of this club is to give students extensive knowledge about fatal diseases like AIDS, HIV, and Cancer.
- 2) Nanhi Chhaan Cell: Launching a crusade against female feticide and deforestation, the college has established a 'Nanhi Chhaan Cell' which functions actively by organizing seminars, extension lectures, rallies and tree plantation drives. The cell has been highlighting crucial issues like gender discrimination and girl education as well as safety of environment.

- 3) Anti women harassment cell: This cell makes students aware of human rights and encourages them to raise their voice against any injustice, harassment or violence inflicted on them.
- 4) Legal Literacy Club: The college strives to make the students aware of their legal and constitutional rights, and raise voice against domestic violence. This club has been established with the help of District Legal Services Aid Authority, Muktsar at the college level.
- 5) NSS: Two N.S.S. units with 100 volunteers allotted in each have been functioning in the college. These units aim at personality development, comradeship, discipline, leadership, secular outlook, dignity of labor and ideals of selfless service among the youth.
- 6) NCC: The college has two units of NCC, with 54 cadets allotted in each unit, aiming to create human resource of organized, trained and motivated youth, always available for the service of the nation.
- 7) Earn While Learn Scheme: This scheme is an attempt to cater to the needs of economically weak students and to develop professional skills among them. Paid working hours are offered to students within the campus in various areas like library, PCO booth, general store, accounts section, for teaching the slow learners, and maintaining the common room. Apprenticeship in these fields helps them in earning their livelihood after they complete their course.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

- moral and ethical values
- employable and life skills
- better career options
- community orientation

To promote moral and ethical values among the students, the college has designated a faculty member as Dean, Religious Affairs and has established a cell Gurmat Sabha that conducts various activities forwarding the humanitarian philosophy of the religion. The different value added programmes and moral education examinations conducted by this cell are as follows:

- 1) Sikh Dharam Adhiain Pattar Vihar Course: It is a two year correspondence course conducted by Directorate, Dharam Prachar Committee, SGPC, Sri Amritsar.
- 2) Dharmik Vazifa Parikhya: Dharam Prachar Committee, SGPC, Sri Amritsar, conducts an examination about Sikh history and religion and gives scholarships to the students. Gurmat Sabha provides study material and coaching to the students for this examination resulting in inculcating moral values and ethics in them.
- 3) *Naitik Sikhya Imtihaan*: Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Ludhiana, conducts this examination imparting moral and ethical values among the students.
- 4) *Dharmik Prikhya*: This examination is conducted by Sikh Missionary College, Ludhiana.

In addition to the above mentioned courses, the institution has two NCC units, two NSS units and other such clubs aiming at holistic development of students by inculcating in them moral and ethical values, life skills, and an orientation of the needs of the community.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

Short term courses have been introduced and designed on the basis of feedback from students. Dean, Academic Affairs, takes timely feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.

1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The college has designated one faculty member as the incharge of all the Short term courses who monitors the admission, curriculum design, and completion of the courses. Emphasis is laid on the hands-on experience. The quality of enrichment programmes is monitored by checking the skills of the learner at the end of the programme.

1.4 FEEDBACK SYSTEM

1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

The affiliating university designs curriculum of all the academic programmers through UG, PG Board of Studies and Academic Council. The members of these bodies are elected by the members of the senate of the affiliating university. Four departments of the college were represented in the UG board of studies.

1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

Feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum is taken by Dean, Academic Affairs through HODs which is further conveyed to the Principal and the members of Board of Studies. This feedback is communicated to the university for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes.

1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

Four new courses B. Sc (Medical), B. Sc (Fashion designing), B. Sc. (Computer Science) and M. Com. have been started during the period 2011-12 to 2015-16. The introduction of these courses was in response to the demand of the students for the same.

CRITERION- II: TEACHING LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 STUDENT ENROLMENT AND PROFILE

2.1.1 How does the college ensure the publicity and transparency in the admission process?

To publicize academic programmes, fee structure, student support systems, facilities available, the college publishes two prospectuses one for humanities programmes and one for professional and skill based programmes. The College website www.gncmkt.ac.in provides the detailed information about all the aspects of the institute.

Apart from this, advertisements in vernacular and English dailies are provided in general and in special supplements like Republic Day, Independence Day, Punjab Day etc. also.

Vans transporting the students from far flung areas also constitute a major part of the publicity process as the banners placed on the vans disseminate the necessary information regarding the admission process.

Pamphlets and Leaflets are distributed through Newspapers and at 'Maghi Mela' which has been commemorated in the memories of Chali Muktas every year in which more than Half Million people congregate. Billboards have been placed at the key places of the city.

Transparency in the admission Process has been maintained by constituting separate admission committees for different programmes. Two senior teachers are appointed to coordinate the admission process and to ensure the adherence to the rules and guidelines prescribed by the affiliating university and the state government.

In Comparison to other institutes, the students and parents prefer our college for quality education, infrastructural facilities and student support systems. A comparison of admission in all the academic programmes is not possible as ours is the only girls college situated in the city and secondly, none of the other institutes are providing the same programmes barring one or two under graduate courses.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profile annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process.

Admission to all the academic programmes is monitored by the Principal with the help of two coordinators and incharges of different admission committees daily during the admission days on the basis of number of students admitted in each course, total fee remitted, and highest marks of students to provide them financial assistance for each course.

After the admission process is over, a review of the same is done and a comparison is made with previous years on the basis of students admitted in each course, in sports, and SC/BC/minority community, and brilliant student categories, and total amount of fee concessions granted to the students. The review of admission process has been highly fruitful as number of students is increasing every year.

To improve the access of the SC/BC/minority community/physically challenged students to higher education, the college follows the rules and regulations laid down by the affiliating university, and the state and central government.

At institutional level, the college has designated a faculty member as Dean, Students' Welfare to procure various financial assistance programmes offered by the government, the affiliating university and other organizations for these students resulting in their increasing strength in the college.

The founders of the institute aimed at empowering the womenfolk by providing quality education, and the institute is striving towards the same aim. Hence, to increase access a fleet of 50 vans provide transport facility, financial assistance by the management and government schemes like **Single Girl Child** are being provided.

The students belonging to economically weaker sections of society are supported with fee concessions and free books. Some of the faculty members, on personal level, also pay fees of some poor students as well as assist them in studies. The college also has, for such students, a provision of the payment of the fees in installments. (For more details see 7.3.1 Best Practice 2)

2.2 CATERING TO STUDENT DIVERSITY

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institute adheres to all the rules and regulations laid down by the state/central government regarding admission, fee-concessions and scholarships for differently-abled students.

In the recent constructions in the campus, an attempt is being made to cater the needs of differently-abled students. As the college library is situated on the first floor, its staff has special instructions to provide these students the services of the library on the ground floor.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If yes, give details on the process.

Yes, the college assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme. During admission, admission committees hold discussions with the students and their guardians/parents regarding their interest and guide them in taking academic programmes and Elective subjects in BA course.

After the commencement of the course, fifteen days period is provided to students to change their subject combinations and even stream of their areas of interest as teachers play a significant role in opting for right combination or course.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge / Remedial / Add-on / Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The institute provides bridge courses to the students of BCA 1st semester for Mathematics, in B.Com 1st semester for Commerce and in B.Sc. Honors (Biotechnology) 1st semester for Biotechnology.

In M.A. History, the syllabus of first semester has been formulated as a bridge course by the affiliating university to cope with the programme.

Teachers provide the students with the study materials, extra teaching time whenever possible and counsel these students to cop up the pressures of new courses.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on the issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college organizes various seminars, extension lectures on social issues like on female feticide, gender ratio etc. The NSS unit of the college sensitizes students on various socio-cultural issues. The chief motive of Legal literacy cell is to make the students

aware of their legal and constitutional rights, so that domestic violence against the women can be stopped to some extent.

The aim of NCC unit is to train the youth into an organized, trained and motivated human resourc available for the service of the nation. Women Anti-Harassment Cell and Nanhi Chhaan Cell have been formed by the college to fight the evils of female feticide, and deforestation.

These cells are actively participating in organizing various seminars, special lectures, rallies, tree plantation etc. in collaboration with various NGOs. The college also distributes plants to students as well as to faculty members on the World environment Day to encourage them to keep the environment neat, clean and green.

Gurmat Sabha cell has been established by the college to make students aware of our rich religious heritage. College also organizes extension lectures on moral values. On current social topics, inter class competitions in debate, declamation, poster making are held from time to time.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners.

Institution identifies the advanced learners by taking feedback from the faculty members through the heads of the departments. It responds to the needs of the advanced learners by taking following steps:

- Special books of advance level are recommended and procured in the library.
- In college library free Internet facility is provided to them.
- Free access to e-journals and e-books in college library.
- Special coaching sessions are arranged for them.
- Advanced learners are also honoured on annual prize distribution function.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The office of the Registrar, House Examinations collects the data and information on the academic performance of the students through class tests, term tests and discussions with head of the departments. Such data is used to conduct remedial classes, special tests and organize motivational lectures for them.

Financial assistance is also provided through government and private agencies to SC, OBC, meritorious, minority community students. The students who are needy but do not fall in these categories are provided financial support by the institute.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching Plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

The College plans the teaching – learning and evaluations schedules by following the academic calendar of the affiliating university. The academic calendar contains the details of the admission schedule, commencement of classes, details about monthly tests, tutorial group meetings, tentative schedule of extra-curricular activities, house examinations, mid semester examinations (for semester classes), special house test and details about autumn, winter and summer break, preparatory holidays, and university examinations (practical and theory).

The college time-table committee prepares teaching schedule for the session. The teaching is planned in three terms from July to September (autumn break), October to December (winter break) January to April (university examination and summer break) for annual system. For semester system, the teaching plans are prepared accordingly.

The college follows the process of continuous evaluation which includes monthly tests, mid semester examinations, house examinations, assignments, written tests, oral tests, group discussions, presentations, seminars and university examinations. After evaluating the answer sheets of mid semester examinations and house examinations, the teachers submit the award lists and answer sheets to the examination branch. The semester/annual examinations are conducted and evaluated by the university.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

Dean, Academic Affairs, as a significant part of IQAC, plays an important role in making the teaching learning process more efficient and effective. It helps in planning and executing various academic activities of the college in the beginning of an academic session and reviews the same in the departmental meetings. It also motivates the teachers to make greater use of information technology which would contribute to improve the teaching – learning process. It also conducts tutorials meetings, keeps the record of student absentee, student's results and departmental workload for a smooth teaching learning process.

Registrar of the college plans and conducts house examination, keeps the record of student awards and internal assessment.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and system available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students.

To make learning more student-centric, the following methods have been adopted by the faculty:

Interactive learning

The institute has adequate spaces for students to take classes and department offices provide scope to the students to interact with teachers after teaching hours.

Collaborative Learning

Learning is made more student-centric by the use of computers, projectors, smart classrooms, laboratories, through group discussions, seminars, quizzes, various competitions like model demonstration, poster making and presentations, debate and declamation etc. and by assigning topics to students on which they make presentations. Guest lectures by subject experts are held to enhance and supplement their knowledge.

Independent Learning

The library, departmental book banks and e-resources like INFLIBNET help greatly in developing the skills of independent learning among the students. Students' participation in book exhibitions also promotes independent learning among them.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

Institution organizes various seminars, extension lectures, skill development programmes and workshops for the students. They get knowledge from the experts of different fields. To promote creativity among the students, the college organizes various competitions and functions e.g. quiz competitions, mehndi competition, rangoli completion, poster making, model making, science fair, book fair and fashion show etc. The student council of the college also plays a very active role in organizing various activities in the college throughout the year.

The college library subscribes 61periodicals and 13 newspapers for the students. Industrial trainings, visits to book exhibitions, educational tours and trips are also organized for the students.

2.3.5 What are technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning - resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The facility of INFLIBNET helps the staff and the students to have access to e-journals, e-books and e-articles. Interactive classrooms; computer, language, fashion designing and science laboratories; and the library further assist effective teaching. PG Department of Commerce used e-learning resource e-pgpathshala under national mission on education of MHRD. Video lectures from NPTEL are used by Department of Mathematics of our college. Department of Fashion Designing used various open educational resources and videos for practical purposes.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

- Seminars, extension lectures, workshops are organized by all the departments of the college. Resource persons of National repute are invited to enhance the knowledge and skills among the students and faculty members.
- Educational visit for the students are organized by different departments e.g. industrial visit by the Departments of Commerce and Business Management, visits to historical places by Department of History, visit to botanical gardens, fisheries, science city by Department of Basic Sciences, visits to news paper offices and T.V. station by Departments of Journalism and English.
- The college library is well stocked with reference books, journals, magazines and e- resources.
- The members of teaching faculty regularly attend UGC sponsored refresher and orientation courses at different universities.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, Personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

Academic support

The heads of different departments along with the subject teacher supervise the academic progress of the students in the respective subjects. The academic performance of the students is regularly monitored. Remedial classes are arranged for the academically weaker students. The college library has a book bank to help the needy and meritorious students by lending text books for the whole academic session.

Personal and psycho-social support

Every teacher is a psychological support of the students. Wherever required, counseling is done by the teacher. Women Anti-Harassment Cell and Student Grievance Redressal Cell are also there to support the students. Professional counseling, mentoring and academic advice services are provided to students through Career Guidance Cell. It guides the students, according to their aptitude and capabilities, for higher studies and job opportunities in different fields.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Our faculty members always think of adopting latest teaching approaches/methods in order to get desired outcomes. This makes the teaching learning process much interesting as well as more effective. The teachers of all the departments are using interactive method of teaching. The faculty uses chalk and talk as the primary method of teaching. Practical/laboratory work is also an integral part of all science/practical courses. Physical models are employed to demonstrate and explain various principles in subjects like Physics, Mathematics, Chemistry, Functional English, Home Science, etc. In other subjects like Zoology and Botany, samples and specimens are extensively used. The use of charts, models, samples and specimens makes the process of Teaching – Learning more interesting and interactive.

Project based learning is followed by the BCA/ PGDCA/ M.SC. (IT)/ B.Com/ M.Com. /M.A. (Sociology)/B.A. (Home Science) students. Some of the faculty members use audio-visual teaching aids like PPT's, Charts, and Maps. Audio tools coupled with Computers and software tools are also used to train students in the areas of spoken English and communication skills. The students of Social Sciences are exposed to practical knowledge through visits, guided study tours and interactions with academicians. The films based on literary, dramas and novels are also used as teaching method by the language departments.

To the teachers who go for innovative teaching approaches and practices, the administration provides an encouraging environment and the needed infrastructure. For instance, the teachers from Department of English planned to start staging dramas from the syllabus after making necessary changes in the script; and they were provided with a computer system and printer to get the script ready for all the students-actors, and the time and space for the rehearsals along with the opportunity of staging the drama before the whole of the teaching faculty.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college owns a spacious library with conducive environment for study. It has 13 Dailies, 61periodicals, 31,35,000 E-books, 6,000 E-journals and Data Base through INFLIBNET and a number of periodicals. Newspapers and use of Internet helps the students to keep track of the latest advancements in a particular field. The library purchases new books and magazines on regular basis, according to new syllabi needs. It also has facilities like Xerox/reprography.

Library is divided in reference section, periodical section, stack room, circulation section and separate reading areas for staff and students. There are two reading halls in the library for the students, one is in the outer section where student can sit with their personal books and second is in the inner section, where they can browse books from the library.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

No, Institution completes the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar.

2.3.11. How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching-learning?

Institution monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching learning through Internal Quality assurance cell (IQAC), which collects feedback from all stakeholders, On the basis of that feedback, institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning. Also the quality of teaching learning is monitored by analyzing the results of House and University Examinations. This exercise of monitoring and evaluating the performance has improved the pass percentage of the students as compared to the university results. The number of merit positions of the college has also increased. Any grievance regarding teaching learning is addressed through Grievance Redressal Cell to improve the quality of teaching learning.

2.4 TEACHER QUALITY

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

Recruitments of the teachers are made through the Directorate of Education, SGPC, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the affiliating university, the State government, and UGC, New Delhi. Vacant posts are advertised in national dailies and are put on the website of the directorate office. Interviews are conducted in the office of the Directorate at Chandigarh, in which the Director, Directorate of Education; representatives of the Punjab Govt. and subject experts and VC nominee of the affiliating University take part.

If need arises, teachers as Guest faculty are arranged at the local level but sanction for the same is also taken from the Directorate of education, Chandigarh and Secretary Education, SGPC, Sri Amritsar.

Sixth pay scale recommended by UGC, study leave, casual leave, maternity leave, earned leave etc. are being provided to the teachers.

For the outstation staff members, the college has a Faculty House with mess facility from the college hostel.

b) Faculty Training Programmes organized by the college:

Department of Computer Science in the college organizes special workshops to teach the use of MS-Office, and internet to the staff of the college. The schedule and content of the classes is adjusted according to the needs of the members taking the classes. Often, in the meetings held by Dean, Academic Affairs, there are elaborate discussions on the significance of proper documentation of the

significant aspects related with teaching-learning, research etc. These meetings also serve as the training sessions for the faculty.

Our management provides financial assistance and sanctions duty leave to the faculty members to attend/present papers in national/international seminars/workshops/conferences and also give study leave to the staff members to pursue research.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards/recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.

Dr. Jasjeet Kaur received a certificate of appreciation by the District Education Office, Muktsar on Teacher Day on 5th September, 2015. Five of the teaching staff of the college are on the Board of Studies of the affiliating/other university. Eleven teachers of the college have visited different institution in the neighbourhood in the capacity of resource persons/subject experts.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

The institute has not introduced evaluation of teachers by the external peers. However, the college obtains feedback from the students through the feedback proforma and the suggestion boxes placed for purpose.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFORMS

2.5.1 How does institute ensure that stakeholders of the institution especially Students and faculty are aware of the evaluation process?

The Registrar, House Examinations ensures that faculty and students are aware of the evaluation reforms and processes of the institute and the affiliating university. The evaluation methods are communicated to the students through prospectuses, in which details regarding house tests, internal assessments and university rules are given, which makes the evaluation process transparent to the students.

Time to time notice on information boards, class room announcements, class tests, assignments, interactive sessions and group discussions also acquaint the student with the evaluation process. Parent-teacher meetings are annually organized by each department of the college to inform the parents regarding academic growth of their wards. Faculty members are guided by the HOD/Dean, Academic Affairs/Principal of the college through departmental meetings and circulars.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

a) Major Evaluation reforms of the University;

Semester system has been introduced by the university for all UG and PG programs.

- External superintendent and external/internal invigilation staff to conduct the university examinations.
- External examiners to conduct practical examination in practical subjects like Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Physical Education, Music, Commerce, Geography, Functional English etc. But, from the session 2014-15, practical examinations are conducted by the college staff as per the guidelines of the affiliating university.
- Spot Evaluation is also another step for fair evaluation of answer books.
- Re-evaluation and rechecking of answer books also helps in fair evaluation.

b) Evaluation reforms of the College;

- The answer sheets of September and December tests are evaluated by the faculty members and are showed to the students and question paper is discussed with the students in the class, so that they can be assured of a fair evaluation.
- Class attendance and behavior, lab attendance (for practical subjects), participation in curricular and co-curricular activities, assignments and project works are considered for internal assessment.
- Extra classes and tests are conducted by the departments for slow learners and encourage them to do better in next tests.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

Institute has Registrar office that looks after the House Examinations and ensures implementation of evaluation reforms initiated by the Institution and the Affiliating University.

2.5.4 Provide details on formative and summative assessment approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

The Registrar Office is responsible for conducting the House examination and complete record is maintained by this Office. The college adopts both formative and summative approaches for evaluation.

Formative Assessment For classes following the semester system, mid semester test and for the classes following the annual system, two term tests are held. Students are also assessed through class test, assignments, quizzes, group discussions, and departmental Activities during the course,

Summative Assessment The university annual/semester examination is the summative assessment.

2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during last four years and weightage assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc?

Rigor and transparency is ensured in the process of internal assessment by keeping the record of class attendance, tutorial attendance, practical lab attendance (practical subjects), awards of September and December terminal examinations, Class test, project work, assignments and practical files (2 years). Weightage for behavior aspects, independent learning and communication skills also taken care for internal assessment.

Also, Faculty members of the each department of the college develop research aptitude among the students by giving project work and assignments. Also experiments in college laboratories (physics lab, chemistry lab, botany lab, zoology lab, computer science lab, Home science lab, fashion designing lab and language lab), Botanical garden, and College library (E-journals, Magazines, journals and books) also help the students to explore innovative ideas and research.

Performance of the students in House Exams, their classroom attendance and their involvement in various activities such as group discussions, presentations and classroom seminars provide the relevant data about the performance of the students. Yes, the college has a Research and Seminar Committee which comprises the head of the institution as its president, bursar as its secretary, and four to five faculty members. The Committee circulates among the teaching staff the information regarding various research projects and seminars offered by the different funding bodies like College Development Council of Panjab University, Chandigarh, ICSSR and UGC, New Delhi etc. It also maintains a record of the seminars, special lectures, talks, interactions that involve external experts and are organized by different departments of the college.

- sanctions duty leaves for field work.
- takes care of the technological and informational needs such as computer systems, wi-fi facility, books and journals in print and on webs.
- facilitates timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding agency.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The college organizes workshops, seminars, special lectures, involving external experts, focusing different research areas in different disciplines to provide exposure to the students regarding the research being carried on in their respective subjects. Classroom discussions and the assignment of various theoretical and experimental exercises also target at developing research culture among the students. Also, they are provided with books, journals, and wi-fi facility in the library to explore further in their areas of interest.

3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research. (Guiding student research, leading research projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc)

In the previous years, four of our faculty members – Dr. Rana Baljinder Kaur (Punjabi), Dr. Mandeep Kaur (Punjabi), Dr. Neena Mehta (Hindi), and Mr. Sunil Kumar (Computer science) – have guided M.Phil. students in their research projects. Presently, a significant number of faculty members are engaged in individual research and they make their research public by presenting research papers in different seminars/conferences as well as by their publications. Research projects are also taken up by the faculty members

individually as well as in collaboration (Details in 3.2.7). While 10 of the teaching faculty of the college are pursuing their doctoral research, 16 have already completed it. Moreover, 27 of our teachers have carried research at M. Phil. Level.

Next, various faculty development programmes such as orientation courses, refresher courses, winter or summer schools, and workshops on different subjects sponsored by UGC or other agencies, are also a great source of honing the research aptitude in the teaching faculty. In the last four years, 40 members of the teaching staff of the college have taken the benefit of such programmes.

The faculty also guide student research in the courses of B.C.A., M.Sc. IT, B. Com., M. Com., M.A. (Sociology), and in the subject of Home Science in B.A. where project based learning is followed.

3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized sabbatical leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?

As many as around 42% of the teaching staff have utilized limited period leave for participating in different workshops/seminars/conferences. Besides, Dr. Bali Bahadur (Sociology) availed a two-year study leave for his doctoral research work from March 2011-March 2014. In July 2012, Mr. Sunil Kumar (Computer Science) was sanctioned a study leave of six months for attending his Ph.D. course work. Dr. Navneet Kumar (Physics) got a leave of one month in the session 2011-12 for his research work at Brookhaven University, USA.

Chief areas, where the benefits of the research of the teachers are transferred to the students and thereby to the community at large, are the classroom teaching and discussions, the assignments given to the students, and the type of activities and enrichment programmes organized for them. A variety of such programmes are organized in the campus where interactions with eminent academicians and subject experts from different fields take place. (Details in 3.1.6 and 3.1.8)

3.2.1 What percentage of total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The college has no provision of allocating any fixed percentage to research in the annual budget. However, it facilitates the teachers' research activities or the organization of the research related events in the campus as far as possible. In the last four years, the college has received and spent the grant of Rs. 3,26,776/- for minor projects, and of Rs.

5,50,000/- for a workshop on research methodology while Rs. 4,13,478/- were spent by the college for the paying the teachers' research activities and the organization of the research related events in the campus.

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

Though there is no provision of "seed money" by the institution, it does provide financial assistance to the faculty members involved in active research. In the year 2011-12, the college provided an aid of Rs. 25000/- to Dr. Navneet Kumar, Asst. Prof. in Physics for his research in the USA.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

The institution has no provision of extending direct financial help to the students. Nevertheless, it makes serious efforts to create such infrastructural and technological facilities in the campus as are conducive for developing research aptitude among the students.

3.2.4 How do the various departments/ units/ staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

A number of teachers in the college have carried out interdisciplinary research taking help from the teaching faculty in the other departments. For instance, Dr. Neeta Kumari, Asst. Prof. in English, in her doctoral research undertook a comparative study of the select Hindi, Punjabi, and Bangla novels and analysed historical and sociological aspects in them. Interactions and discussions with the faculty members from the departments of Hindi, Punjabi, History, and Sociology proved to be a great help during the research.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

For the optimal use of various equipment and research facilities, the institution ensures that all the students and the staff is well aware of the same. The Principal and the research committee motivate the staff to make best possible use of the available resources by exploring further in the areas of their interest; the staff, in turn, sensitizes the students to raise questions and try to find the answers of the same by using books, journals, e-resources, and internal facilities available in the campus.

3.2.6 Has the institution received any special grant or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

In the last four years, the college has received grants amounting to Rs. 34,12,098/- from UGC for science laboratories, language lab, home science lab, books and journal in the library, computer systems and wi-fi facility in the campus. Grants also have been received for various research projects as mentioned in 3.2.7.

- Dr. Jagdish Kumar (History) completed a UGC sanctioned minor research project titled *Printing Press and Development of Punjabi Language*, *1849-1919* (April 2010-January 2012). Total grant sanctioned and utilized was Rs. 1.10 lakh.
- The college received and spent a grant of Rs. 5,00,000/- from ICSSR for organizing a ten day research methodology workshop (21-30 March,2015).

In order to establish an interface between academic knowledge and the needs of the villages amidst which the college is situated, the Department of Basic Sciences has initiated a programme under the title "Rural Academia Interface". Its first activity was carried out on April 12, 2016 at the village Khunan Kalan where Dr. Mandeep Kaur, Asst. Prof. in Botany, interacted with the villagers regarding the benefits of vermicomposting. Two students from the department Jyoti and Nimarpreet Kaur gave the demonstration of the process. The programme also included government agency in the form of Agriculture Development Officer, Malout, S. Sukhwinder Singh who briefed the villagers about the government policies and schemes regarding aid for setting up a vermicompost pit.

The diet counseling cell being run at the campus is another effort of the institution to make the students, and through them the community, aware about healthy. The recent activity of the cell focused on the awareness about nutritional anemia.

The fructification of these efforts gets manifested in the encouraging number of student membership in various cell/clubs/associations active in the college (detail in 3.6.1). Further, the college has two units of NCC with 54 cadets in each unit and two NSS units—one aided and the other self-financed—with 100 volunteers in each.

The college plans its extension activities with the objective of making the learning of its students a holistic experience bringing the academic, community, and environmental aspects together. For instance the cycle rally organized by the college aimed at sensitizing the students as well as the society through them regarding the benefits of cycling for better environment, safe roads and good health. It brought encouraging outcomes as some of the students actually shifted from scooters to cycles and many other expressed their decision to do so. In the same vein, in the awareness campaign "Polythene Free Campus" students took pledge not to use polythene bags not only in the college campus but also in their routine life. In vermicomposting project initiated by the college, the students and the teachers of the department of Basic Sciences visited a nearby village Khunan Kalan where

the teachers gave a presentation to the villagers explaining the process and benefits of vermicomposting. Here, the students of B.Sc. (Med. & Non-Med.) did a great job in giving a demonstration of the process. Resultantly, the women of the village showed a particular interest in the process expressing that they would use the technique for their kitchen gardens.

In its all reach out activities targeting the community development, the college ensures the active involvement of community and, where needed, of the administration also. The cycle rally starting from the college made its way through the busy bazaars and street of the city spreading its message among the members of the community. Furthermore, in this activity as well as in the awareness campaign "Polythene Free Campus", the college established a direct access to the community through the involvement of its students who are the future face of the society.

4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

4.1.1 What is the policy of the institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

Policy of institute for creation and enhancement of infrastructure is framed in accordance with the prime objective of SGPC to meet changing trends and the international standard of education. The management has positive approach and also procures funds as per need for the development of physical infrastructure and facilities to run various programs effectively.

The strategy is chalked out by local management committee, principal and bursar in consultation with building construction committee and purchase committee. Policy focuses to create and enhance new infrastructure, renovate and maintain existing infrastructure in line with increasing student strength and technology up gradation.

4.1.2 Detail of facilities available for

- A) Curricular and co-curricular activities classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.
- B) Extra –curricular activities sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

(A) Detail on facilities is as given below:

Classrooms: The college has three teaching blocks housing 46 classrooms and 20 laboratories. Each classroom is equipped with basic facilities like green/white board, lecture stand, chairs, fan and electricity fitting for smooth functioning of teaching.

Technology enabled learning spaces: Library, seminar hall, laboratories, computer laboratories and digital language lab have computers and internet facility for advanced

teaching and learning requirements. College has three classrooms with smart board available for interactive dynamic teaching. Apart from this, the institute also has 6 projectors placed in classrooms and seminar hall. One portable projector is also available in the institute. All the departmental offices have computers with internet facility.

Seminar halls: one fully air conditioned seminar hall with the seating capacity of 200. The hall is equipped with audio-visual aids including projector, display screen, internet facility and audio system.

Tutorial spaces: Class Rooms is used for tutorials.

Botanical garden: The institute has a botanical garden. The area is maintained and monitored by the faculty of botany and nursery men.

Coaching centre for Competitive exams: College has a coaching centre in its premises working under experienced teaching faculty of college. Under its guidance and support, students are prepared to qualify UGC NET and other competitive exams.

Laboratory: college has 20 spacious laboratories including Science laboratories, Fashion designing laboratories, Biotechnology lab, Computer laboratories, Geography lab, Home science lab, Language lab and Music laboratories. All laboratories have specially designed work benches and cupboards for easy handling of articles during practice. Store rooms for storage of lab equipments and chemicals are also provided for laboratories. Instruments are calibrated and repaired from time to time as per need. All laboratories have lab attendants for instructing and monitoring the student's activities in laboratories. In the last five years, Science laboratories and Fashion Designing laboratories have been established in campus. Computer laboratories and language lab have been upgraded and relocated to newly constructed IT Block.

Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research: College has 4 computer laboratories with all IT facilities. The campus has Wi-Fi internet facility to enrich the knowledge of teachers and students. All the laboratories are equipped with latest equipments for giving hand in experience of practical work. All departmental offices have computer facility to aid teaching and learning. Departments maintain

departmental book bank to provide books and other learning materials to faculty and students.

In order to channelize the creative energy of the youth, the college provides a platform to the willing and enthusiastic students. The add-on department of Journalism maintains a **wall magazine** showing students' creativity in writing on burning issues, personality development and general awareness.

(B) Sports:

Mai Bhago stadium is a two storey building having spectator gallery and grassy ground with standard track of 400 m. Along the periphery of the ground there are cemented steps for seating of students. Sports stadium building also has one multipurpose hall for indoor games.

Outdoor and indoor games: the institute has 400m track for all track and field events, play grounds for Volleyball, Hockey, Football, Hand ball, Badminton, Kho kho, Kabbadi and Gatka (Sikh martial art) and one hall for indoor games like Taekwondo, Judo, Table Tennis, Boxing and Kabbadi (National style).

Gymnasium: Gymnasium is furnished with twister, leg and arm curling machine, bench press, treadmill and multipurpose mats etc.

NSS: The institute has two NSS units with 100 volunteers allotted in each, working under two programme officers. NSS office is housed in the stadium building with facilities like computer, internet and almirah for storage.

NCC: NCC office is located in the stadium building. It is furnished with computer, internet facility and almirah. The unit has adequate material for cadets.

Cultural activities: The institute has two open air stages to conduct the cultural activities. The institute maintains a **heritage museum** in campus. The museum contains articles related to Punjabi Culture.

Public speaking: The institute has public addressing system connected to all corridors with central control in reception area for addressing students, teaching and non teaching staff members.

Communication skill development: For communication skill development, there is a language lab with 1 LCD, internet facility and 11 computers configured with orell software and connected with headphones.

Health & Hygiene: the college has one visiting doctor for hostel. In addition, one person is appointed for 24 hours emergency services. Various awareness camps and seminars are organized time to time.

For hygiene purpose, each building has toilets. About 20 class IV employees are deployed for cleanliness of the entire campus. Dustbins are kept in each corridor, passages and other open areas. Also considering the impotability of ground water in the Malwa region, the college has 6 water filters with RO system.

Other physical facilities in the college:

Administrative block: for administrative work college has an administrative block with biometric attendance system. The block houses the offices of the principal with retiring room, the bursar, dean academic affairs, dean UGC affairs, registrar house examination, and superintendent and account office and clerical office. All the offices are furnished with computers with IT facility and furniture. There is a spacious reception area to seat 50 people in waiting coming to meet the principal. To foster the practices of hospitality, a kitchen and pantry is operational in the block.

Committee Room: For meetings a well furnished committee room with attached washroom is housed in the administrative block.

Gurudwara Sahib: for religious activities, Gurudwara sahib is situated within the premises of the hostel.

Parking area: college has three parking areas for students, faculty and college vans respectively. Each entry gate of parking area has security men to check entry of outsiders.

Lawns: the institute has 10 beautiful grassy lawns with eye feasting landscape for students and faculty to spend their leisure time. The rich landscape is maintained by support staff. The beautiful scenery gives entirely different appearance to campus in contrast to the city.

Shopping centre: one shopping centre with 9 shops including a general store, a book shop, a photography studio, a food point, a café, a garments shop and other related shops to meet the daily needs of boarders and day scholars.

Canteen: the institute has one spacious tastefully furnished canteen with separate sitting areas for students and faculty. The quality and hygiene of food served in canteen is regularly checked by the canteen committee.

Common room for students: there are two common rooms for students of undergraduate and postgraduate classes.

Staff room: College has one well furnished staff room with air cooler, refrigerator, microwave oven and storage facility for faculty.

Transport: College has a bus to transport the players, NCC cadets and for other students for various purposes. More than 50 vans cover the area of radius of 45 km of the town.

Generator: for uninterrupted power supply, the institute has three generator sets with capacity of 25KV, 83KV and 125 KV.

4.1.3. How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (encloses the master plan of the institution / campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions if any).

College has adequate infrastructure to meet the requirement of 8 undergraduate, 7 post graduate, short term and add-on courses with 2500 students' on rolls. The institute always focuses to fulfill the growing needs of student and faculty. The highly committed administration always ensures the availability and optimal use of infrastructure. Heads of department and incharges of various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities analyze the requirements from time to time. The requirements are planned for infrastructure augmentation on regular basis (refer 4.1.1).

To examine the optimal use of infrastructure, incharges are deputed in each block that ensure the presence of students in classrooms and laboratories and utility of

infrastructure. All classrooms and laboratories remain busy according to scheduled time table. Lecture wise time table is displayed outside each room which shows the availability of rooms in different periods. The seminar hall, library remains busy almost every day for extension lectures, seminars, workshops and various other academic activities.

The institute also provides infrastructure to carry out several activities besides regular academic activities.

- The college is used as examination center by state government, C-DAC, TET and various other recruiting agencies.
- The institute is used for conducting cultural and religious activities.
- The Infrastructure is also used as Evaluation Centre of Panjab University, Chandigarh.
- Building is used for creating polling stations during Lok sabha and State
 Assembly elections and also as centers for making new Voter Cards/Aadhar
 Cards etc.
- Sports stadium is also used as venue for conduct of Zonal and District level
 matches of schools and colleges, athletic meets by District Athletic Associations
 from time to time.

The facilities developed/augmented in the last four years

A number of new facilities have been developed in the institute in the last four years. The college has constructed fully furnished faculty house and guest house for comfortable stay of staff and guests. Two storey sports stadium is also among newly constructed buildings in the campus. Students' hostel building has been extended to increase accommodation of boarders. Science laboratories and Fashion Designing laboratories have been set up in recent years. Detail of amount spent in augmentation of infrastructure is as shown in table

4.1.4. How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The institute gives emphasis on creation and improvement of infrastructure facilities to meet the requirement of differently-abled students. Ramps are built in newly constructed teaching block for the ease of such students. There is provision of special toilets for such students. Special care is taken while framing time table and examination seating plan. Classrooms for differently abled students are confined to ground floor. Vehicle access of handicapped students to utmost point of building is given.

4.1.5. Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

- Hostel facility accommodation available
- Recreational facilities, gymnasium, yoga center, etc.
- Computer facility including access to internet in hostel

- Facilities for medical emergencies
- Library facility in the hostels
- Internet and Wi-Fi facility

- Available residential facility for the staff and occupancy
- Constant supply of safe drinking water
- Security

Hostel faculty: College has one Mai Bhago Girls' hostel within the premises with 74 rooms and one warden room with attached office. The girls' hostel is divided into 4 blocks with 300 accommodation capacity. All the rooms have air coolers and uninterrupted power and water supply. The hostel is also equipped with solar and electric geysers for hot water during winters.

For hostel service a warden, one assistant warden, one clerk and five class IV employees are appointed.

Recreation facilities:

- Hostel has one recreation room with LCD and audio system where the hostlers can spend their leisure time.
- The hostel also has badminton court for outdoor game.
- In addition, there is reception area and a room for visitors with attached kitchen.
 A peon is appointed permanently for service during visiting hours of parents and guardians.
- Newspapers and magazines are subscribed for hostlers separately.
- Canteen is available for hostlers during day time.
- There is a spacious dining hall with seating capacity of 100.
- Hostlers have access to lawns in college campus till limited hours in the evening where they can enjoy lush green beauty of college.

Computer facility: One computer system in warden's office is also available. Hostlers are allowed to keep laptops in their rooms.

Medical facilities: there is an arrangement of one qualified doctor who visits hostel twice a week. One person is permanently appointed for medical emergencies.

Internet and Wi-Fi facility: Hostel has Wi-Fi internet facility.

Residential facility for staff: Mata Tripta faculty house is situated in the college for outstation staff. It has 4 fully furnished apartments having uninterrupted power and water supply. The faculty house has 2 solar geysers to supply hot water and 1 water purifying unit for safe drinking water.

For guests and resource persons from outside, college has 6 guest rooms situated in stadium building.

The college also has made provision of accommodation for two drivers and a gatekeeper in the campus.

Security: The institute gives a great emphasis on security and safety of girl students. For the purpose college has 24 hrs security systems for college and hostel.

- To keep vigil on activities, each building has adequate number of CCTV cameras with monitoring screen in the principal's and warden's office.
- Two gatekeepers, one armed watchman and two guards are appointed by the college for security of college and hostel.
- The campus is enclosed with 12 ft high boundary wall to avoid trespassing
- There are 15 flood lights to counter darkness during night.

4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

The college provides first aid service to staff and students for minor medical problems. In hostel a general physician visits twice a week for addressing the medical problem of hostlers. To handle emergency situations, one person is appointed on permanent basis to take patient to hospital. Moreover, seminars and health care camps are organized from time to time in college by various units.

4.1.7 Give details of the common facilities available on the campus –spaces for special units like IQAC, grievance redressal unit, women's cell, counseling and career guidance, placement unit, health centre, canteen, recreational spaces for staff and students, safe drinking water facility, auditorium, etc.

College offers a wide scope in common facilities for students and staff within the campus. The institute has about 15 active units working under incharges who take care of curricular, co-curricular and extra- curricular aspects in every sense. The institute has provided special rooms for IQAC, students' welfare department, career guidance and coaching centre and red ribbon club. Other units have individual incharges who work from their departmental offices. Among additional common facilities and services college has a canteen, shopping center, stationery room. Detail of facilities is as follows:

- **IQAC:** Office of IQAC unit is housed in the administrative block. Meetings of IQAC are held in the principal's office regarding performance evaluation and quality up gradation.
- Grievance Redressal cell: The unit is working under Vice Principal from its
 office in administrative block. The cell strives for immediate and effective
 redressal to students' complaints and problems.
- **Studens' Welfare:** Students' welfare work is divided among different in charges for effective functioning. Scholarships and other welfare schemes for students are dealt with from the office of Dean, Students' welfare. Students' council is headed by a different in-charge. These offices are housed in sports stadium building.
- Career guidance cell: The unit is housed in computer department and works under the supervision of a teacher from the department of computer science. Seminars, tech fests and workshops are organized by this unit. Faculty members also guide students for higher studies and job opportunities in different fields.
- Coaching Centre for competitive exams: the college has one coaching centre for competitive exams housed in sports stadium building. The centre guides and prepares students for UGC-NET and other competitive exams.

- Nanhi Chhaan Cell (save tree and save girl child): The cell is housed in the department of Punjabi. Trees are planted on various occasions in college. The cell organizes various awareness programs on female feticide also.
- **Gurmat Sabha:** To make students aware of Sikh heritage, Gurmat Sabha is working under Dean, Religious activities. Its office is located in Sports Stadium Building.
- Alumni association: The college has an active Alumni Association, registered under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 under registration no 5979. It is functioning under the charge of a Dean. The Alumni Association maintains a cordial relationship between the College and Alumni.
- **Diet counseling cell:** Diet counseling cell is working under incharge from department of Home Science. The office is housed in the same department. Office for the cell housed in the department.
- The institute also has Legal literacy club, Red ribbon club and Women anti
 harassment working under individual incharge. All units organize various
 seminars, camps, and awareness programs for students and society.
- Departmental Students' Associations: The institute has literary association
 working under different departments like English Literary Society, Punjabi Sahit
 Sabha, Hindi Sahitya Parishad, Economics Association, Home Science Society,
 Guru Nanak Sociological society and Science society.

Canteen: College has a spacious canteen with a kitchen, serving area and separate seating area for students and staff. Infrastructure and building has been upgraded in the last five years. Canteen service and quality of food is regularly monitored by canteen committee. College also has one food point in shopping centre. Hostel mess service is also availed of by college staff during special occasions.

Stationery Room: The institute has a stationery room to make the requisite stationery such as various registers, answer books for house examinations, pro forma for recording

absentee, markers, chalk and duster etc. to the offices in the administrative block and the departments.

Recreation space: The college has a serene green campus. The beautiful landscape and the well kept lawns attract and rejuvenate the mind of spectators.

- For faculty, one common staff room is in administrative block. Each department
 has individual office for faculty to sit. The staff rooms are equipped with modern
 amenities and infrastructure.
- For students, the institute has two common rooms, a big hall in canteen and 5 grassy lawns to sit and enjoy.
- College has gymnasium for faculty and students.
- Sports ground is accessible to students during free time.
- College also has a shopping centre with 9 shops to cater daily needs, stationery, food point, photo studio and laundry.

Safe drinking water: for safe drinking water, adequate number of RO systems is installed in different teaching blocks, administrative block and hostels.

Yes, library has an advisory committee. Composition of advisory committee comprises Head of the institute as **President**, Librarian as **Secretary and Three to four senior faculty members**.

The advisory committee takes important initiatives from time to time for upgradation of library materials and services. Meetings of advisory committee are organized in principal's office at the start of session. The committee frames guidelines and rules for making it user friendly. Numbers of significant initiatives have been taken by the committee in last five years for service improvement. Number of supporting staff in

library has been increased for assistance. Library maintains its website and updates information on library activities and new arrivals. Numbers of books and journals have been significantly increased in library.

The total area of the library is 213.2 sq. mts. with the seating capacity of 125. The working hours of the library are 9.00 AM to 4.00 PM on all working days, before and during examination, during vacation except Sundays and gazetted holidays.

The library has three reading halls—one for members of the faculty and two for the students. There is subject wise arrangement of books in stack area. Newspapers, journals and magazines are kept in the periodical section. For online access of e- resources, the library has a computer section with internet facility. The library also has a circulation and maintenance section for issuing and returning books.

4.2.3 How does the library ensure purchase and use of current titles, print and e-journals and other reading materials? Specify the amount spent on procuring new books, journals and e-resources during the last four years.

Library is very meticulous for purchase of current titles, e-journals and other reading material. Heads of department put demands for purchase of new materials which are approved by principal. Library demands catalogues from publishers, search online and look for vendors to procure material. Teachers also visit book stores and national and international book fairs for purchase of new titles.

Library staff provides personal assistance to staff and students in various forms. Library staff gives routine library services such as timely issuance and return of books to students and staff; checking the intactness of the returned books and replacing them in their respective shelves. The supporting staff helps in finding books by using catalogue. They also maintain a congenial milieu in library for quiet study.

In addition to routine library service, the library staff orientates visitors about services available in the library. Library assistants participate in activities like assisting in locating reference material; supervises users during exercise on computer; helps in browsing of eresources. Library maintains its website and updates information on activities and new arrivals.

- Seminar hall is equipped with projector facility for seminars, special lectures and workshops.

- The institute has 5 projectors in the classrooms of different teaching blocks and one portable projector that can be installed in classroom when the need arises.
- The administrative block is fully computerized with Wi-Fi internet facility.
- Computers in department offices are also used for preparation of teaching learning materials.

The institute gives emphasis on active learning using technology enabled learning spaces. Faculty always takes efforts for easy understanding of complex concepts using online teaching-learning resources and computer aided techniques. The following facilities render the role of facilitator for teaching-learning processes:

- For the students' support, Institute has 177 computers in different laboratories, library, classrooms and seminar hall. Technicians in computer science laboratories are always there to address student's problems.
- The infrastructure is provided to meet the curriculum requirements of the students and also to enhance their independent learning through the use of e-resources, INFLIBNET, Internet etc.
- College has 3 rooms with smart boards to prepare and deliver lecture.
- 5 class rooms have projectors for presentation of academic topics, seminars and videos for interactive teaching and learning.
- Digital language lab for students.

- Students prepare power point presentations and hold seminars in ICT enabled spaces.

4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

For upkeep of infrastructure and facilities, the institute has different committees and in charges. The institute has cleanliness committee with 20 class four employees for upkeep of buildings. Similarly for landscape and ground maintenance the institute has constituted a landscape committee. College has appointed 8 gardeners and helpers for upkeep of lawns and sports ground. Attendants and technicians have been appointed for maintenance and upkeep of their respective domains.

For maintenance of buildings and facilities, the institute has construction committees, furniture incharge and sanitation and electricity incharge. Two electricians have been appointed for maintenance of electric equipments. Also heads and incharges take the services of experts for service and repair. The incharges visit their respective domains frequently to get the required repairs done. In addition, staff and students also register their complaints or suggestions with the heads of the committees for maintenance and upkeep the infrastructure and facilities.

4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

Calibration and precision measures for the equipments and instruments is taken up by their respective departments. The measures are taken on the basis of following criterion:

• Faculty works on instruments/equipments at the commencement of every academic session for their uninterrupted functioning throughout the session.

- If operator observes inaccurate results while working with instruments and calibrates with given standards.
- According to the guidelines of repair or maintenance provided by suppliers or on the manuals.

After finding the problem, faculty calls suppliers/ company for repair of instrument. Servicemen visit the institute to fix the problems. Record of repaired items and their bills are maintained by the college. Computer lab technicians resolve computer related problems within the campus.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The institute ensures the upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipments. Voltage sensitive instruments are installed with voltage stabilizers. Computers have UPS and standalone UPS for voltage stabilization. Two electricians have been appointed for the maintenance and upkeep of electric fitting and appliances.

Underground submersible water pumps and water tanks are constructed in the college for constant supply of water. ROs are placed in the college, hostel and faculty house for safe drinking water.

5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

Yes, the college publishes two prospectus one of degree and another for professional courses. The prospectus is updated every year. It provides information to the students seeking admission in the college and enlightens them regarding the academic and administrative structure and functioning of the institution. It also provides them information regarding the vision, mission, history and a brief profile of the college. It also provides information about the different committees, facilities available in the college, facilitators, policies and programs of the institution. It is a comprehensive document that covers under graduate and post-graduate programmes offered by the college, eligibility criteria for admission in different courses, Structure of each programme, subject combinations available in each programme, an admission schedule, academic and coacademic calendar, glimpses of activities of the previous academic session, fee structure for each programme, information regarding the various scholarships, free ships, stipend, prizes and fellowships available for the different category of students. The information given in the prospectus is strictly followed by the faculty and students to ensure transparency and accountability.

The college ensures its commitment and accountability by constituting various committees/societies under the supervision of experienced faculty i.e.:

In light of the University and Punjab Govt. Rules the college administration committees, admission committee and IQAC forms, procedure and rules regarding the admission in the college. Similarly scholarships and stipends are given to the students on merit and need basis. At the beginning of every academic session various cultural societies create a

platform for the new comers to promote and search their skills and talents. Special programs such as talent hunt, the science fair are organized for this purpose. The college always follows the student centric approach. For this the college has started various welfare programs—for the students like special scholarships, freeships and remedial classes for the slow learners to enhance their academic capabilities. In addition to this, inputs in the form of feedback from the students, faculty, visitors, guests, academicians keep the institution accountable and on the right path.

5.1.2 Specify the type, number and amount of institutional scholarships / free ships given to the students during the last four years and whether the financial aid was available and disbursed on time?

The College follows the philosophy of Guru Nanak's teachings which believes that the institution should have the social responsibility towards the underprivileged, downtrodden and marginalized section of the society which will be helpful to create an egalitarian society. In light of this the college has formally set up an office of Dean Student's Welfare which guide and assists students requiring financial support in the form of fee concession and scholarships from the college and other funding agencies. The Dean Student's Welfare assists SC/ST/OBC and minority candidates in case of problems faced in getting the necessary forms completed and attested. The main activity of this office is to find out funding agencies that can support financially to the students and fill their scholarships forms of different categories of the students and send them to different national and international funding agencies for financial assistance. Whatsoever financial assistance the college receives from the Centre Govt./ State Govt. and other agencies, the college also add its own fund to it.

5.1.4 What are the specific support services/facilities available for?

The college is committed to provide the students every possible help and support they need in their pursuit to become worthy citizens of the society. The college, as stated earlier, was set up with a mission of imparting holistic education to the women folk. The institution for this purpose provides the following support facilities to its students:

> Students from SC/ST, OBC and Economically Weaker Sections

The college strives to neutralize the distortions of downtrodden/ underprivileged sections of the society who have suffered in the past and still facing varies kind of economic, socio-political disparities in the society. Therefore, for the welfare and empowerment of these communities and to bring them into the mainstream of the society the college took an affirmative action and an office of Dean Student's Welfare

has been set up in the college, which guide and assists all the students requiring financial support or fee concession in getting appropriate support from the college and other funding agencies. Under the supervision of this office the college provides the following facilities to these students:

- They are given liberal financial assistance to pursue their studies without any economic constraint. In the current financial year (2015-16) there are 85.60 per cent scheduled caste students who are getting free of cost educations in the college under the Ashirwad Scheme of the government of Punjab.
- Both Scheduled Caste and Backward Classes students are also getting Post
 Matric Scholarships by the Punjab government under Ashirward and Post
 Matric Scholarships to the Minority community students' schemes.
- The college follows the reservation policy in admission as per the Central, State Government/ University rules.
- Special concessions are also given every year to the scheduled caste and
 economically weaker students in the hostel fee even some students are
 exempted from paying the hostel fee.
- Most of the departments of the college have their own book banks, they also lend books to these students for the whole session.
- The college also provides ample opportunities to the students by offering paid work to the students belong to the economically weaker sections of the society. The college provides them working opportunities in various areas like library, STD booth, general store, accounts, and computer related works for filling scholarships forms, prepare lists, typing etc. Apprenticeship in these fields helps them in earning their livelihood.

> Students with Physical Disabilities

- Differently-abled students are provided financial assistance by the college as a part of its fee concession policy and also out of the Student welfare Fund.
- These students are getting scholarships and stipends given by the various funding agencies.

- The college always tries to create a disability friendly environment in the campus, in light of this special arrangement of the classes and hostel room for differently-abled students are made on the ground floor by the college administration. The institution buildings are designed and built disable friendly as the ramp is built on the IT block, separate toilet/ washroom facility is provided to these students.
- Similarly, separate parking area is also provided to these students.
- The college abides by the policies of the government while giving admission to students with special needs.

> Overseas Students

Although at present we do not have any overseas student in the college, but the institution does not believe in boundaries. To extend its services to overseas students the managing committee of the college (SGPC, Sri Amritsar) has signed MOUs with the Cambridge University, UK, and Sheridan University Canada to promote students and faculty exchange programs.

> Students to Participate in Various Competitions/National and International

Students who participate in various competitions are provided with:

- The college provides T.A, D.A, and reimbursement of registration fee.
- Sports kits and uniforms also provided to the students
- Special diet/ meals are given to the sports persons before and during competitions
- Extra classes for the students involved in such activities
- Fee concessions and Freeships are also provided to these students.

➤ Medical Assistance to Students: Health Centre, Health Insurance etc.

 All students are covered under the Students Safety Insurance Policy No 200181 of United India Insurance Company Limited. If there is any mishappening occurs during the college hours they will get the compensation as per rules.

- A first aid room is established for the students and hostellers.
- A qualified doctor visits the hostel twice a week, her services can also be availed in case of any emergency.
- For any Emergency, the college has assigned duties to one of its employees to take the students' patient to the nearby hospitals, having a tie up with the college.
- Seminars on various medical problems like AIDS, Breast Cancer, problems of
 adolescent, etc. are held in the college time to time. Even a special programme
 under the name of Red Ribbon Club has been started in the college campus.
 The main aim of this programme is to make the students aware of fatal
 diseases like AIDS, HIV, TB, and Cancer etc.
- The department of Home Science provides information to the students under its Diet Counseling Cell regarding the healthy food and nutrition that can help the students to enhance their immunity.
- This year PG department of sociology with collaboration of Red Ribbon Club organized 1st Voluntary Blood Donation and General Medical Checkup camp in the memory of *Late Sr. Jagjit Singh Sidhu* former Additional Secretary of Local Managing Committee.

> Skill Development (Spoken English, Computer literacy, etc)

- The college has set up a Language Laboratory, which helps the students to improve their listening and speaking skills.
- The department of English organizes different activities throughout the year to improve language skills among the students like declamation contest, paper reading contests, poem recitation competition, beautiful handwriting, creative writing competitions, movies and documentary shows, special shows for course related movies and animation films.
- Department of Computer Science time to time organizes Computer Literacy
 Programmes for teachers, non teaching department and students.

- The college has provided computer systems to all heads of departments with 4G internet facility. Students and teachers of the department can use these systems to enhance their skills in IT.
- The Department of computer science also offers one Add-on-course in "Information Technology" and a modular course "Basics of Computer Science" to enhance computer literacy among the students.

> Support for "Slow Learners"

- Every department at its own level has a mechanism in the forms of monthly, biannually tests and assignments. Through this system, they identify students with learning disabilities and slow learning capabilities. These departments arrange special classes, counseling, coaching for these students and sometimes they adopt special teaching methods to teach these students so that they can perform better in their final examinations. Some departments take extra classes for the students who lag behind in studies due to their participation in sports, extra-curricular and cultural activities.
- Special Remedial classes are planned to enhance their subject knowledge and to complement classroom teaching.
- Monthly or occasionally tutorials sessions and classes are planned in order to enhance problem solving capabilities.
- Throughout the academic session some departments arrange various Training Programmes, Lectures, Personality Development, Stress Management, and Time Management Programmes for such students to improve their IQ level for the up gradation of knowledge of their students.

> Exposures of students to Other Institution of Higher Learning/ Corporate/ Business House etc.

The departments of Biotechnology, Fashion Designing, Basic Sciences,
 Commerce, and Business Administration organize exposure trips for their

students to various higher education institutions, corporations, and industries etc. to expose the students to the business environment and recent research in their concerned fields.

- Students from the department of Commerce, Business Administration, and Fashion Designing go for four to six week training in different industries, banks, etc. Department of Basic Sciences arranges visits to fisheries, botanical gardens, science city, and thermal plant.
- Educational trips to different universities, research institutes, historical places,
 TV stations, head offices of News Papers, are organized to enhance the knowledge of the students.

> Publication of Student Magazine

The students are provided with a platform to hone their literary skills through the college magazine "Roop Mani" published annually. It is published under the supervision of a teacher Editor-in Chief. They evince their literary bent of mind through different genres in various sections like English, Punjabi, Hindi, Home Science, Religion, Computer Science, Basic Sciences and Planning Forum etc. The students contribute in the magazine with their poems, stories, articles , essays and give expression to their creative thought and talent. The principal patronizes a duly constituted editorial board.

5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

- To cultivate, perpetuate and enhance interest in entrepreneurship among the students of the college, the college offers UGC approved job oriented Dual Degree Programs in Fashion Designing, Journalism, Information Technology, and Communicative English.
- The college has also successfully run various Short Term Courses like Food Preservation, Cooking and Baking, Cutting and Stitching, Printing and Dying, Art & Craft, English Speaking, Basics of Computer & Internet, Mathematics

for Competitive Exams under the supervision of various departments. The foremost objective of introducing these courses is to prepare the market oriented youth and enhance their skills which have practical utility for job and self employment.

- Various job oriented professional courses have been started by the college such as B.C.A BBA, B.Sc. Fashion Designing, M.Sc.IT, and M.Com.
- The Fashion Designing and Home Science departments also promote and support the development of income generating skills among students, which can be utilized later in their life to earn livelihood.
- In department of computer sciences, students have been given free access to use the college computers. They have also been provided the facility of internet under the supervision of their computer teachers and they are guided to use different software to develop entrepreneur skills in them.

5.1.6 Enumerate the policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities such as sports, games, Quiz competitions, debate and discussions, cultural activities etc.

- * Additional academic support, flexibility in examinations
- * Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials

The co-curricular and extracurricular activities are an essential part of education. The college has designated faculty members as Deans Sports and Dean Cultural Affairs who are working in following manner:

Dean Cultural Affairs

The Dean Cultural Affairs organizes a Talent Hunt show for selection and grooming of budding artists. Similarly, the college celebrates various festivals like Lohri, Teej Festival, Baisakhi, Basant Panchmi and birthdays of all Guru Sahib, students of all departments actively participate in these occasions and perform various cultural

activities. The selected student artists are granted liberal financial assistance in the form of fee concessions, stipend depending upon their achievements in the University Youth Festival and other inter-college competitions. At present these performances linked incentives range from Rs. 200 to total fee concession. Besides, giving monetary assistance the procures them costumes, training, transportation refreshment etc. All winners are honored at the Annual Prize Distribution Function of the college

Dean Sports

Under the supervision of dean sports the college has produced many players of the National and International level in various games and achieved the pinnacle of success for the institution. In fact, this department is the nursery of internationally recognized sports persons as one of our students, Sarbjit Kaur Babbu played in Indian team and won women Kabbadi Cup for Indian in the 5th World Kabbadi Cup 2014. Besides promoting sports for competitive purpose, the institution encourages mass participation in sports. Every year they organizes annual athletic meets and inter-class sports competitions for this purpose in which students of all departments actively participate in various games. The teachers give extra time for academic guidance and coaching to the students participating in sports activities. These students are provided flexibility in house examination. Sometimes special exams are conducted for them. The university, on the recommendation of the college had exempted Sarbjit Kaur Babbu an international level Kabbadi player from appearing in annual examination as she was participating in the said competition. She was given a special chance by the university to appear in the examination.

Some significant sports facilities available in the college are:

- Playgrounds and free accommodation in the Hostel for players.
- Medical Fitness programmes under the guidance of physical trainers.
- Inter departmental competitions

- Expert and special sports coaches are appointed/ hired to provide the necessary coaching and training to the sports persons.
- Students are given free ships, special stipends, cash prize etc. During the last four years freeships of worth rupees Rs. 57, 96,512/- has been given to the 653 sports persons. Refreshment during training and competitions is given to students during such event.
- Winners are given due recognition and are appreciated with appropriate reward. For outstanding achievements media coverage is arranged and when required.

5.1.7 Enumerating on the support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the competitive exams, give details on the number of students appeared and qualified in various competitive exams such as UGC-CSIR- NET, UGC-NET, SLET,

ATE / CAT / GRE / TOFEL / GMAT / Central /State services, Defense, Civil Services, etc.

The students appearing in the various competitive examinations are extended all possible help. The college library is well equipped with sufficient learning resources for competitive exams. The college has set up a "Centre for the Coaching of Competitive Exams" for the students. This center has its own library enriched with good books and journals related to various competitive exams. Every year a number of students appear for competitive exams and many achieves good scores. Students who are preparing for competitive exams are given facilities in the following ways:

- Classroom discussions and activities on relevant topics, class presentations and group discussions, help and prepare the students for these exams.
- Seminars/ lectures/ interactive sessions with experts/professionals from various fields are held on a regular basis to educate them about the significance of various competitive exams in diverse areas and the best strategies to crack them.
- Workshops and extension lectures on Resume Writing, Facing an Interview, and
 Group Discussions are held to hone the soft skills of the students.
- They are guided by their teachers at a personal and institutional level, both within the classroom and outside about various institutions and job avenues available to them after the clearance of their examinations.
- The library also provides various journals and magazines to students for the preparation of competitive exams. Even the coaching center has its own special library which provides books, Journals and Magazines for competitive exams. Every year, college spends a considerable amount of money for purchasing books and subscription of journals. Regular updating of periodicals, newspapers, journals and magazines in the library is undertaken so as to provide the students with the best material for study.
- The whole college campus and hostel is connected with 4G internet speed through Wi-Fi.

Teachers also borrow study material/books/journals from nearby PU Regional
Centre Muktsar library and other libraries of the area on individual basis to
provide an extra edge to the students preparing for various competitive exams.

5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

In light of its vision and mission, the college has developed two formal mechanisms for providing coaching and counseling to the student, one is Career Guidance Cell and other is a Centre for the Coaching of Competitive Exams. The Faculty members who act as counselors or coaching providers are accessible and assist students with solutions in areas such as academic difficulties, career options; personal, social and family problems, etc., through meaningful communication and connection with each student, counselors are able to handle many complicated issues. Sometimes even parents of students are counseled to make them realize what is best for their children and open their minds towards unconventional courses. This is done with the coordination of the Principal, Faculty and the Admission Committee and various other academic bodies of the college who constantly guide students'. Apart from this various other informal student counseling and mentoring mechanisms are also active in the college which include the following:

Tutorial Classes: This is a well established academic counseling process with the help of which teachers are able to provide academic/ personal counseling to students on various issues related with their personal and academic issues.

Counseling by the Teachers: Teachers extend counseling services on the academic program by preparing students for semester exams, internal assessment, project preparation, and presentations as required by the university (B.Com and B.B.A.). During the interaction of Steering Committee with the teachers some of them informed that they also try to solve personal problems of the students related to family, employment as well as career, choosing the right course for their career.

Psycho-social Counseling: it being a girls' college, it is important to make their mind set for different types of jobs because district Muktsar is considered as an educationally backward area. The people of this area do not prefer jobs in the private sector for their girls. In light of these different departments/ teachers of the college provide counseling to change the mindset of the students and their parents towards jobs because students want to accept only white collared jobs in the private sector. Students are motivated to get part-time and vacation jobs with industry, banking and other sectors.

5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of its students? If 'yes', detail on the services provided to help students identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview and the percentage of students selected during campus interviews by different employers (list the employers and the programmes).

Yes, the college has structured mechanism for Career Guidance for students. The college aims at becoming an instrument in the welfare and progress of its students. To achieve the purpose, the Career Guidance Cell of the college motivates and facilitates the students of this remote region for higher education and employment.

Following its mission 'To Shape Young Minds through Knowledge and Skills' and holistic development of the students according to the changing scenario of the society. The college endeavors to enhance its quality to bring its students at par with the rapidly

changing educational, social and market demands. Every year, the Career Guidance Cell forms different teams of teachers who visit schools of rural areas of nearby districts and counsel their students regarding the various courses, financial assistance schemes, job opportunities available for them in the market. To train and motivate students for competitive exams, the college has established a training center under name Centre for the Coaching of Competitive Exams in 2013. With collaboration of other departments, it organizes personality development and skill enhancement activities to make students employable. The mock interviews are conducted by the experts.

5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the Grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, the college has set up a Student Grievance Redressal Cell in the college. This cell is playing an active role in redressing students' problems in the college campus. Students have been given right to appeal. They can convey their problem through direct contact with the Incharges or through feedback boxes placed at the different locations of the college. This Cell functions on the basis of the suggestions/ complaints collected from various feedback boxes in which the students are free to express their problems and also suggest remedial actions. The major grievance of the students has been regarding the restriction on the usage of mobile phones and cleanliness of rest- rooms and hostel mess, water purification, etc. During the last four years the following major grievances have been redressed:

Throughout the year, different types of seminars, extension lectures, legal literacy programs are organized to sensitize the students about their right, duties and responsibilities and safety measures. In addition, the college administration has taken the following steps to ensure the security and safety of its students within the college and hostel campus:

- Students feel safe and secure in the college campus because the requisites security measures adopted in total in the forms of CCTV cameras.
- Round the clock vigil by security personnel and guards.
- A regular police patrol outside the college, and road barriers within the radius of 100 meters of the college, also ensure the safety of the students
- Training of special games which can be helpful for self defense like *Gattka* (Sikh Martial Art), Tae Kwon Do, Judo, Boxing and wrestling have been given in the college.

• The college has arranged transportation facility for the students for the convenient and safe commuting.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes, the college has an 'Anti Ragging Committee'. Every year at the starting of new session a special orientation programme for new comers is organized. In this programme students are made aware of different committees, cells, and the organizations. they are also sensitized about the harmful effects of ragging. Students are also informed about the Anti Ragging Committee' through notices board, prospectus and the college website. The staff members are vigilant in the campus and CCTV cameras are installed in the different corners of the college campus to prevent such instances. This has led to make our college campus safe and free from ragging. Fortunately till date no any cases have been reported in the last five years.

5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

The major objective of the college is to impart quality / value based education and mold students into rational thinkers, globally aware and responsible citizens. Therefore the college motivates the students to pursue higher studies in their area of interest and ability. The students are also guided about various entrance procedures of PG, M. Phil and Ph.D Courses at the universities and other reputed institutions. Different departments continuously makes efforts to facilitate the employment of students in various fields. They guide the students' aboutthe nature, scope and implications of various subject streams which help them to shape their career.

Some departments of the college like PG department of Sociology and Department of Business Administration also encourages students to opt research projects as per their ability and interest. Students who are pursuing professional courses such as BBA, B.Sc (Biotechnology, Fashion Designing), B.Com, M.Com, MA and M.Sc-IT and Mathematics are encouraged to take up jobs in Banking, Information Technology, Insurance and Educational sectors. Mock interviews are conducted by the placement cell

and Coaching Centre to build up the confidence of the U.G and P.G students. For this purpose, various departments' organizes motivational talks and seminars. Similarly, personality development workshops are also conducted time to time by some of the departments. The advertisements related to various training institutes are displayed on the notice boards and the students are informed about the available employment opportunities and entrance tests published in the newspapers, magazines and journals even through tutorial classes.

Department of Mathematics, Business Administration and Department of Economics organizes Seminars, Workshops, Extension Lectures and Orientation Programmes to enha nce the necessary employability skills among the students. Since 2013 PG Department of Mathematics with collaboration of Apex Education Pvt. Ltd Bathinda organizes seven day workshop to make students enlighten about the different competitive examinations. The students are also attached and informed via whatsapp and email for regular updates of current affairs, advertisement of various vacancies offered by Government, Private and other agencies. But in spite of this people of this area do not want their daughters to go in private sector for employment.

5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

The College is known for its academic excellence and is committed to ensure quality education and hundred percent results. The diagnostic and remedial classes are organized for those students who are at risk of failure the College have adopted various methods to help the weaker students in academics. The college organizes free remedial classes in which special attention is given to the students who are weak in studies. Personal attention is given to the students in tutorial classes. In tutorials students can discuss all their problems with their respective mentors.

Weak students in academics are also given incentives in the form of various scholarships, Mai Bhago Stipend, book bank and special help by the teacher if needed. Regular informal parent teacher meetings also provide the much needed support to these students.

- Special/Remedial classes/Lectures, etc., along with class tests to keep a check of progression.
- Supplementary notes, Study material, etc. that are easier to understand and available.

- Personal one to one interaction

The College has a set pattern of obtaining the feedback from the graduates and uses the same to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. Under the guidance of Principal various committees collects and analyses the exit level feedback from the graduates and postgraduates regarding the learning experiences during their stay at the College and hostel. The stakeholders from various committees and heads of various departments are also members of IQAC. The inputs obtained from them are used to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions. Some important channels of feedback are as:

- The Alumni Association meeting is the most important one for feedback. The
 graduates can convey their suggestions for the betterment of the college without
 any pressure and fear. The form is also uploaded on the college website with a
 link to the Alumni.
- Verbal Feed- back of students is also taken by Heads and Block In-charges of different departments. The college also takes feedback from students through the feedback/ suggestion boxes installed at different places of the institution on various aspects of college. The questionnaire/ feedback/ suggestion slips are analyzed and appropriate measures are recommended to the concerned teacher/employee for timely action.
- Minutes of the staff meetings are recorded by the Dean, Academic Affairs all
 faculty members can also personally share their ideas and feedback with the
 higher authority.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like Catalogues, wall magazines, college magazine, and other material? List the publications/ materials brought out by the students during the previous four academic sessions.

The college brings out annually an issue of the college magazine "Roop Mani" to give vent to the creative writings of the students. The students are encouraged to contribute articles for the college magazine in various languages and disciplines of their choice. The magazine is divided into various sections based on different disciplines offered by the college. The process of collecting articles, designing cover page, editing etc. are carried out by the Student Editors with the help of teacher editor. The editorial board of the college magazine comprises of the chief editor, staff and student editors for various sections.

Apart from this, students are also encouraged to write their field reports and present paper in the departmental seminars any hesitation is aptly dealt with by the faculty and due guidance is provided to them. Department of Journalism always encourages students to share their views and thoughts on the wall magazine. Similarly, every year department of Basic Sciences organizes different functions such as Science Mania and Science Contest in which students are free to share their creative/ innovative ideas through poster making and presentation.

The college has a student council, which is a unanimously elected body made up of President, Vice-President and members. The college follows Panjab University Chandigarh's rules and regulations regarding the procedure of selection and functioning of Student's Council. Its main objective is to represent the interests of the students. The council members hold meetings with the Principal of the Institution during which they raise issues about various college aspects that concern them, and ensure that their voices are heard. They also extend a helping hand in managing college functions and events such as seminars, conferences, annual functions of the college, etc. Most importantly, the council works hard for the incessant improvement of the College. The functioning of the student council does not involve any major finances. However, any expenditure pertaining to council activities, if at all, is borne by the college.

- It contributes to all aspects of such functions that include discipline, hospitality, stage management and general organization.

- The Council takes care of the maintenance of student facilities and infrastructure.
- The members of the Student Council are alert to their responsibilities as role models and leaders.

- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC): Students have their representation in the IQAC president and vice president of cell become members of this committee
- Amalgamated Fund Committee: There are also student representatives in the Amalgamated Funds Committee generally students, members of this committee. The Students are nominated from the Student's Council.
- College Magazine Committee: The student editors of the college magazine "Roop Mani" help the teachers in the compilation process of these magazines
- College Hostel Committees: There are various committees in the hostel who assist teachers and hostel warden in executing their duties. The hostel Head Girl, who is nominated from the senior most classes, helps the hostel warden in her administrative work. Some of the major Hostel Committees are as Mess Committee, Discipline Committee, and Cleanliness Committee, Purchase committee, Hostel Gurudawara Sahib Managing Committee, Committee for Extracurricular Activities and Floor in-charges of each block.
- Seminar and Extension Lecture Committee: The College provides opportunities to students to participate and organize seminars/workshops/industrial tours/ study tours so that they can develop their organizational and managerial skills.
- College Discipline Committee: Some students are also the members of discipline committee they play a major role in maintaining discipline in the college campus. Similarly the class representatives also play a major role in maintaining discipline in the classrooms, especially when the teacher is occupied in any important meeting/work.

• Students Association:

There are some Student's Associations active in the college these are English Literary Society, Guru Nanak Sociological Society, Punjabi Sahit Sabha, History Association, Hindi Shahitya Parishad, Gurmat Sabha, Science Society, Economic Association, Mathematics Association, Management Students' Association.

The College alumni association was launched with the objective of promoting and inspiring a feeling of fraternity among older students and faculty. The alumni association has maintained the database of addresses and telephone contacts of the former faculty/ employees and alumni. Every year, college organizes an alumni meet for which the alumni are invited by using the mode of correspondence such as a telephonic intimation/SMS/newspaper advertisement/ publishing on the internet/Maintaining records or through the college website. The college also keeps in regular touch with the retired faculty members. They are invited in all the college functions. The retired faculty member who is also a member of the IQAC cell is invited to all the meetings of IQAC. As per the contact with former faculty is concerned the college maintains a regular contact with its former faculty who grace all the important functions and events of the college such as the Prize Distribution Function, Convocation and Seminars. They are also invited to attend the farewell or retirement parties of other faculty members (Teaching as well as non-teaching staff).

6.1 INSTITUTIONAL VISION AND LEADERSHIP

To shape young minds through diverse knowledge and skill development programmes and inculcate in them human values, the ideals of social justice and peaceful co-existence, in harmony with Nature and humankind to achieve Guru Nanak's vision of egalitarian society.

I. NEEDS OF SOCIETY:

Muktsar is located in south-western part of the Punjab. It is one of the educationally backward districts situated merely 30 km away from Indo-Pak Border. The overall literacy rate of females in Muktsar is just 59.2 %, being second lowest of all the districts of Punjab (Gender Statistics of Punjab, 2012 Economics and Statistical Organization, Punjab). Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) of girls in higher education is also quite low. In 1970, the condition of female literacy was even bad. So, with very grand notion, founders of the college conceptualized foundation of girls institute in the area with the idea of improving the female literacy rate and thus their social status to make them confident enough to enjoy the right to live freely their life with a sense of self-worth, respect and dignity. Since then, the institute is working with goal of not to be successful in terms of

wealth but in terms of achieving prerequisite fundament of equality, i.e. educated society. Moreover, to provide easier access to education, a fleet of 50 vans cover Muktsar city and nearby villages, for safe and problem free service. As outcome of all these efforts, in 2015-16, 2441 girls got enrolled in this institute. Thus, the institute is playing important role in improving the scenario of female literacy in the region.

II. STUDENTS IT SEEKS TO SERVE:

As the prime objective of the institute is education of girls so to achieve this, it is strived hard to provide opportunity of education to girls irrespective of caste, creed, community and financial status. This is done by conveying proper information through various sources, about the facilities/ scholarships provided by the government as well as the institute. It is also ensured that proper and maximal use of those facilities is made through functioning of office of Dean, Students' Welfare.

III.TRADITIONS AND VALUE ORIENTATION:

Institute focuses on ideals of social justice, human values and peaceful co-existence in harmony with humankind and nature. For this purpose, a separate and well functional branch of Gurmat Sabha is established, which is headed by Dean, Religious Affairs. Every year it carries out many activities to root students and staff to the traditions and values. It also facilitates conduct of two year correspondence course and three examinations on moral education. In collaboration with Guru Gobind Singh study circle, a registered organization, it organizes 7 days camp and lectures to provide value education and impart the sense of co-operation, tolerance, non-violence and foundation of the quality life.

To build citizens who posses strength, integrity, fortitude and regeneration of values towards Nation building, morning assembly is organized daily in which hymn of the Tenth Guru of Sikhs, Guru Gobind Singh Ji, followed by National anthem is recited. A separate prayer house has been established in the hostel to encourage Righteous conduct (Dharma), values of respect and peace.

Birthday of first Sikh Guru, Guru Nanak Dev Ji is commemorated by continuous nonstop recitation of all the verses from the Guru Granth Sahib from the beginning to the end and followed by langar (Community meal), which is prepared and served by students. It builds the sense for Guru Nanak's teachings of: *Vand Chakko* (Sharing with others) *Kirat Karo* (Earning a living honestly) and *Naam Japna* (Meditating). Seasonal and cultural festivals are also celebrated with full fervor in the Institute by people of all religions to encourage social cohesion and essence of prosperity. It includes celebration of Lohri, Basant Panchami, Holi, Teej and Diwali.

Institute also promotes the sense of responsibility towards environment protection. The steps taken in this direction include ban on polythene in campus, setting up of vermicomposting unit for conversion of organic waste into valuable manure, more and more plantation, cutting down contribution to pollution by lesser use of Air conditioning units and conveyance pooling system adopted by faculty members.

VI. FUTURE VISION:

Institute's future vision is based on Guru Nanak's vision of egalitarian society. The concept is very clear in the mission statement. Egalitarian society is viewed in way that all humans are equal in fundamental worth of political, economic and social status. Institute aims to achieve the fact that egalitarianism should be reflected in the natural state of humanity. By educating girls, gender equality in rights, responsibility and economic status is sought by the institute.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of quality policy and plans?

Top level management, Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC), Sri Amritsar, is a charitable and humanitarian organization founded in 1920. It manages the Sikh shrines, found educational institutes, charitable hospitals and homes for physically/mentally challenged people. SGPC realizes the need to make its contribution in the field of education in order to serve the society in much more holistic way. At present, SGPC runs 72 schools and 39 colleges and 1 University. The Governing Body is committed to

provide such learning environment in its institutions which, besides protecting and nourishing the creativity of students, also nurture them to be good citizens. It is conscious about the changing trends of education; taking bold steps to meet international standards in education. So, the policies and plans of institute are designed in line of vision and mission of the governing body.

Principal, the head, of the institute plays central role in designing the quality policy and plans in collaboration with members of IQAC. The Heads of Departments and teachers incharge of different committees, with help of faculty members and students, gather the information related to various departmental particulars and provide it to IQAC. Members of IQAC compile complete data from all departments and present it to the Principal. Based on this data, strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges of various aspects are analyzed thoroughly. Outcome of this analysis are the objectives / amendments in Quality policy and plans designed to match the present needs of Institute for continuous progress. The last step of designing includes review and approval of quality policy and plans by the management, who provides its valuable suggestions and makes suitable amendments.

Principal and IQAC play an important role in the implementation of Quality policy and plans. They follow the strategy of division of responsibility for better implementation. Various designations, departments and committees/ cells/ bodies are constituted for this purpose. Actual implementation of objectives and plans is achieved through efforts of faculty members and students, who work under the light of above dignitaries to provide practical shape to the policy.

6.1.3 What is the involvement of leadership in ensuring;

- The policy statement and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission.
- Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan.
- Interaction of stakeholders

• Proper support for policy and planning through need and analysis, research inputs and consultations with their stakeholders

Principal plays pivotal role in designing policy statement in line with vision and mission under the guidelines of the Governing Body and as per needs of the institute. IQAC compiles performance reports of all the departments at the end of the session. After deep analysis of all the data collected, it prepares annual report. Based on this annual report, SWOC analysis is done and accordingly policies and plans are designed. In addition to this, Principal holds meetings with Deans, Heads of all the Departments and Committees/Cells to review their functioning. To accomplish the policy, suitable strategies and action plans are formulated under the guidance of the Principal and IQAC. Outcome of those action plans is constitution of different new committees/bodies through which actions are implemented. Principal delegates responsibility of different departments and committees to experienced faculty members by designating them as Heads of Departments and Committee In-charge/In-charges. Heads look after the academic matters whereas different committees work for administrative/ academics/ students welfare/ all round development inculcating in students the ethical and moral values depending upon nature of the committee. Faculty members of departments and students play important role in carrying out actions in the right direction.

Vision, mission, policy, strategies and action plans are communicated for interaction of stakeholders in different ways like meetings with members of local managing committee, parents of the students, alumni etc. Activities like athletic meet, Gurpurab celebration, teachers' day celebration etc. also serve the purpose. A variety of printed material used include prospectus, college magazine, notices, circular book, newspapers and various functions organized in college.

➤ Reinforcing the culture of excellence: To create the culture of excellence, leadership resides with the most committed and experienced employees of the institute. Leadership is involved in reinforcing the culture of excellence as follows:

- Leaders are involved in formulation of vision and mission of the institute. By
 doing this, the priorities are set by analyzing internal and external
 opportunities and threats.
- Recruiting well qualified staff is one of the most essential components of excellence. Faculty members are also facilitated to improve their qualification and skills from time to time.
- Meetings are conducted before commencement of session or before organizing any event to communicate the expectations from the members who have been assigned different duties
- Team work is promoted by assigning duties team wise. This reduces the
 pressure of work and improves efficiency. They assign the authority to a
 particular member of the team deputing team leaders. It allows employees to
 improve their decisive skills. After completion of task, feedback is obtained
 from employees on how to do things better.
- Leaders recognize the fact that the best ideas emerge out of exchange and sharing of ideas between individuals and teams. This promotes the participative culture in the college.
- Standardization of norms is done to avoid any disparity and variations.
- ➤ Champion organizational change: Changes in organizational standards are brought from time to time to facilitate the adaptation of the institute to the changing scenario of education at global level. This is done by initiatives of leaders and hard work of teams. It includes:
 - Augmentation in infrastructure (Refer 4.1.3), resources in library (Refer 4.2.3) and number of faculty (20 new recruitments since 2012). Faculty members are motivated and facilitated for qualification improvement e.g. for attaining Doctorate degree (Refer 3.1.7).

- Increased financial assistance and number of scholarships are made available to students (Refer 5.1.2). Increasing number of students is indicative of the above efforts.
- To maintain the pace of amplified work, technical facilities are upgraded in the college office, computerized catalogue is used in library, campus is made Wi-Fi, technology based Teaching-Learning methods are adopted and communication with stake-holders (teachers/students) through social media.
- Keeping in view the facilities required in terms of infrastructure, affiliating university created Spot Evaluation Center in the institute in 2015-16.

6.1.3 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

Institutional policies and plans are monitored and evaluated by the management, Principal and IQAC through the functioning of Bursar, different Deans, Registrar, house examinations etc. Effective implementation of policies and plans is collaborated efforts of Heads of Departments, teachers in-charge of various committees/ cells. Proper execution of plans is carried out through faculty members and students.

• **Bursar:** Looks after the financial matters of the college. Monitoring of financial matters is the integral part of functioning of Bursar. She has the prime role in Budget allocation. In light of allocated budget, requirements are asked for from different departments, cells, committees, etc. All the purchase exceeding Rs. 500/- is done by inviting quotations which are then evaluated according to specifications and price of the product. Scrutiny of all the bills is done before recommendation for payment. Record of bills is properly maintained. Functioning of committees like: Amalgamated fund committee, Purchase committee, Construction committee, furniture committee, etc. is monitored by Bursar.

 Registrar: Monitors the conduct of house exams according to university guidelines. Record of all the data related to house exams is maintained by the registrar.

• Deans:

Dean, Academic Affairs: Academics are the core of all policies and plans of the Institute. All academic activities are monitored through functioning of Dean, Academics, who also carries out internal academic audit from time to time. Before commencement of session, tentative workload of all the teaching departments is sought, in the light of which new recruitments are made. For smooth conduct of academics different committees are functional: Time table committee prepares effective time table for graduate classes following Punjab University guidelines. Monitoring of students' attendance is done fortnightly through Students' Attendance Committee. Monitoring of conduct of classes on daily basis is done through proctors. Smooth conduct of tutorials is monitored by tutorial group committee. At end of session, feedback from students is taken.

Dean, Sports: Monitors all sports related activities including selection of teams, event participations, recommendations for free boarding lodging of the deserving sports persons, maintenance of all records etc.

Dean, Students' Welfare: Keeps an update on various scholarship schemes that can be made available to students. Also monitors the proper dispersal of amount of scholarships and renewal of scholarships.

Dean, Cultural cum co-curricular activities: Monitors cultural and co-curricular aspects of the institute.

Dean, Religious activities: Monitors the conduct of activities to root students and staff to the traditions and religious values. .

 Heads of Departments: Monitor their departmental activities through meetings with faculty members from time to time and feedback from students. **IQAC** prepares the annual report by compiling the reports received from various departments, committees, bodies, etc. This annual report is presented to the Principal and sent to the SGPC for further evaluation.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

Governing body, Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC), Sri Amritsar, runs number of educational institutes; charitable hospitals and homes for physically/ mentally challenged people. S. Kirpal Singh Badungar is present President of SGPC. He is Chancellor of Sri Guru Granth Sahib World University, Fatehgarh Sahib. He is a learned personality having teaching background. Education committee directs a body, known as Directorate of Education which looks after the functioning of all the institutes managed by the committee. Dr. Dharminder Singh Ubha is present Director of Education. He is also serving as Principal GSSDGS Khalsa College, Patiala. Principal of Guru Nanak College for Girls, Dr. Tejinder Kaur Dhaliwal is presently member of Punjab Public Service Commission. She was the first woman academician to be appointed as Chairperson of the Punjab State Education Board. Officiating principal, Mrs. Navjot Kaur, is very experienced faculty from the department of Punjabi. Besides providing opportunities to the above mentioned senior faculties, top management inspires other faculty members to develop innovative ideas in teaching- learning as well as administration. Management allows the institution to take decisions independently regarding most of its affairs, nevertheless its suggestions are always valued.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

College grooms leadership in its staff and students by giving them authority, along with responsibilities of work in their respective fields.

Administrative level:

Principal directs all the administrative and academic activities of the institute. One of the senior faculty members has been designated as **Vice-Principal cum**

Bursar who looks after the financial matters and ensures smooth functioning of administrative committees. Complete charge is taken by her in latter's absence. Skills of administration in faculty members are improved by giving them charge of administrative committees.

> Academic level:

College provides higher and more responsible positions like **Deans and Registrar** to senior faculty members, inculcating in them the ability to hold still higher authoritative positions. The senior most member in the department holds the position of **head of the department**. Under their guidance, rest of the faculty members executes departmental activities. Various faculty members, from different departments with junior faculty as members of their team are assigned charge of different **academic committees/ cells/ bodies**. It helps in maintaining coordination among the faculty of different departments. Their functioning provides platform for interaction of experience holders with learners. This provides them ample opportunities for grooming leadership, decision making as well as management skills

The offices like **Students' Council representative, class representatives etc.** help groom leadership at student level.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

College believes in decentralized governance for better implementation of policies and plans. To accomplish this, college divides administrative area and delegate duties to the faculty members in form of bursar, registrar and deans. In addition, there are teachers incharge of different committees related to academic, financial, cultural, co-curricular and students welfare affairs.

College has also delegated authority and flexibility to departments on various academic matters including allocation of classes/papers, preparation of teaching plans and timetable for PG classes etc. In case of more than one subject options offered by university in curriculum, Head of Department decides on the paper to be taught. Heads of departments have full authority in recommending and purchasing requisite books, magazines, journals and instruments within allocated budget. Another important area includes organizing seminars, workshops, extension lectures and also inviting the reputed resource persons for the same. They also have freedom in organizing extra-curricular activities like tours, industrial visits, intra College or inter college competitions. Recommendations regarding leaves of faculty members are made by Heads of respective departments.

6.1.8 Does the college promote culture of participative management? If 'yes' indicate the level of participative management.


Yes, college promotes culture of participative management. It is clear from governance model (Refer 6.2.1) that decision making, regarding various matters, involves active participation of management, Principal and faculty as Principal's advisory committee, Deans, Registrar, members of IQAC, Heads of various departments and incharges of committees/ cells to different extends. All the said members except management members, participating in various academic and administrative processes are actually part of academics.

Society is not at all a neglected part as the local managing committee comprises representatives from different walks of society. Feedbacks from alumni (now are part of society) also provide valuable feedback. Thus, all the academic and administrative affairs are completed with the collaborated efforts of Management, Principal, staff, students and members of community.

6.2 STRATEGY DEVELOPMENT AND DEPLOYMENT

6.2.1 Does the institute have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Mission statement of the institute, in itself, is the idea to drive quality and is thus regarded as quality policy as well. It lays focus on the objectives of not only academics, but also on the overall development of the students fulfilling the concept of egalitarian society where, strengthened, empowered and yet humble minds are shaped. Ideals of past (traditions and values), present (earning livelihood) and future (sustainable existence) go hand-in-hand to achieve the best.



GOVERNANCE MODEL

The policy is developed following "**Bottom to Top**" approach, where students and faculty serve as source of information generation. This information is compiled by Heads of departments and further conveyed to IQAC. The collective report of all the departments is further analyzed for SWOC by members of IQAC. Principal, in collaboration with members of IQAC, works for development or amendments of policy matters.

Once the policy is developed, suitable action plans are prepared by members of IQAC with the approval from the Principal, to drive it smoothly. The action plans include

formation of different departments, committees, cells or associations etc. The senior most member is designated head or incharge of these departments, committees, cells or associations who are given the authority as well as responsibility of concerned matters. The faculty members and students of aforesaid are then deployed to achieve the stated policy objectives. This is the level of hierarchy where actual implementation of action plans occurs.

Feedback received from students, performance reports from faculty members and annual reports provided by head/ incharge serves as source for SWOC analysis by IQAC, thus, beginning the fresh cycle of policy/ objectives generation or amendments.

6.2.2 Does the institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan.


The Governing Body has a separate perspective plan for the development of its institutes. This plan is prepared based on the requirements of the institute and is also included in the annual budget of the top management. It keeps provisions for the infrastructural developments, introduction of new courses, appointment of faculty members and financial aid etc.

Perspective plans are also prepared at college level based on the SWOC analysis of annual report. This analysis lay down the foundation for future plans. Aspects considered at this level are academics and student support system.

6.2.3 Describe the internal organizational structure and decision making process.

Internal organizational structure is as follows:

The decision making is done by the Principal with approvals from management. It also involves active participation of Heads of Departments, incharge committees, cells, association; faculty members, students and alumini as they provide information, feedback and valuable suggestions on various matters. IQAC makes its suitable recommendations on these issues.



6.2.4 Give the broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

Teaching and Learning:

- Various Academic committees are formed for proper conduct of teaching learning process e.g. Time Table committee, Students' Attendance Committee, Library Advisory Committee.
- Remedial classes are arranged for slow learners.
- Advanced knowledge is provided through Audio-Visual Aids, Expert Lectures,
 Seminars, Web links, Internet Facility.
- Many scholarships are made available to meritorious as well as needy students.
 Students with special achievements in sports are given fees concessions. Students, with extraordinary achievements in different fields, are motivated by rewarding them with prizes/awards.

Research and Development

- Institute has formed a research committee to promote research related activities. It
 helps in passing information regarding research projects offered by various
 funding agencies.
- Various departments organize workshops, conferences, seminars, etc. Faculty
 members are also motivated to attend workshops, conferences, seminars etc.
 organized by other institutes. To facilitate aforesaid, there is provision of duty
 leave, payment of TA/DA and registration fee.
- There are 61 periodicals in the library, access to INFLIBNET with 6000 journals and 31 lakh books and wi-fi campus.

Community Engagement: The institute has constituted NSS unit, NCC unit, Red Ribbon Club, English Literary Society, Red Cross Society, Nanhi Chhaan Cell, Legal literacy club, Diet counseling cell and Gurmat Sabha to carry out community oriented

activities with the help of faculty and students. Various departments also contribute towards community by organizing activities related with social evils.

Human Resource Development: Salary is paid as per norms of UGC pay commission and it is released before 10th day of the next month. Professional development of faculty members is supported by institute. There is provision of duty leave for faculty members to participate in orientation courses, refresher courses, workshops, conferences, seminars and to deliver guest lectures. There is provision of casual leaves, medical leaves, earned leaves and maternity leaves too. There is summer, autumn and winter break as per university calendar

Career Guidance Cell is established for students to provide suitable help regarding career options. Many job oriented Add-on, short term courses are run to promote entrepreneurship. Various types of scholarships are made available to students, which include scholarships for meritorious students, students belonging to SC and BC, for Cancer and AIDS patients, etc. in the last four year about 50.57 % of the total students have been provided with financial assistance of Rs. 4,59,08,901/-. Fee concessions are given to needy students and to wards of class IV employees.

Industry interaction: There is limited industry in the area of Muktsar but still, different departments arrange interaction of students with industry stakeholders by organizing visits and trainings in industries located in and out of the town. Industrial experts are invited for guest talks also.

6.2.5 How does the Head of institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available to top management and stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The President, SGPC chairs around 4-5 meeting in a year with the Principals of all the institutes run by it. These meetings are important source of feedback of institutes' functioning. Separate meetings between the Principal and the Secretary (education) and Director (Directorate of Education) are also convened as per the need. Annual Reports of

the institute and individual teachers' performance proformas are also sent to the management.

Other mode of information dissemination to stakeholders includes annual reports which comprise of various achievements and activities of the college in every field. This report is formally read on annual function. These reports are sent to the top management, to review the activities of Institution. Co-curricular and extra-curricular achievements are shared on Guru Nanak Dev ji's *Prakashpurab* (Birthday) celebration. Other sources include electronic and print media, telecommunication, internet and mail etc.

6.2.6 How does the management encourage and support involvement of the staff in improving the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional processes?

Management is in favor of participative spirit to encourage and enhance involvement of its staff in institutional processes. All important administrative committees include faculty as its members. Suggestions extended by the faculty help in expediting decision making process. Management gives annual increments based on annual performance to encourage and reward them. Professional development of staff is always supported by the management. Their personal problems are also handled with concern.

6.2.7 Enumerate the resolutions made by Management Council in the last year and the status of implementation of such resolutions.

Management decided to provide salary hike to teaching staff appointed on ad hoc basis. It has been implemented from session 2015-2016. Another important resolution was passed on 11/7/2014 for grant of funds from SGPC to the college for construction of new building to the tune of Rs. 82,32,000/- . Work will start soon on this project.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

No, affiliating university does not make any provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievance/ complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for prompting better stakeholder relationships?

Following the guidelines of University Grants Commission, college has formed a Grievance Redressal cell. It plays an active role in redressing students' problems in college campus. Students can convey their problems by writing application directly to redressal cell or through:

- Teachers / Tutors
- Students' council
- Suggestion/ complaint box

Members of grievance redressal cell convene meetings with the principal in which the nature of complaint is analysed and directed to the concerned authority of college for quick resolution.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been and instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No case has been filed by or filed against the Institute in the last four years.

6.2.11 Does the Institution have mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

Student feedback is taken by Dean, Academic Affairs to monitor and review the teaching-learning process and other aspects of Institute. Deficiencies and weaknesses revealed by analysis of feedbacks are tried to overcome maximally. Based on the

feedback from students, Institute purchased new computers and furniture, installed more water RO systems, replaced boards in classes, provided the facility of common room, etc.

6.3 FACULTY EMPOWERMENT STRATEGIES

6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?

The institute organizes various types of faculty development programmes to enhance the professional development of its teaching staff. The members of the teaching faculty also attend orientation and refresher courses, workshops, short term courses and summer and winter schools besides different seminar, conferences etc. organized by other institutes/universities. The facilities of duty leaves, reimbursement of registration fee, TA and DA is also provided. Further, the college facilitates the professional growth of its teachers with a regular augmentation of the library and internet resources.

6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The institute organizes orientation program every year to retrain its staff, on different matters pertaining to faculty empowerment. The institute also organizes seminars, conferences, workshops, guest lectures, etc. There is provision of study leave and duty leave for staff to attend trainings or other professional development programs. Employees are motivated by providing increments, promotions and appreciation in the staff meeting.

6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

Transparent appraisal system based on Punjab government and UGC guidelines is adopted to evaluate performance of the staff. Promotion to next grade/scale is strictly

according to API score gathered during teaching-learning process in prescribed duration. Self appraisal forms prescribed by the UGC are filed by staff members. These are evaluated by screening committee in the college and further send to top management. Annual report of performance, including activities attended outside the campus as important component is also collected from every staff member.

6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

Outcome of review of performance appraisal reports by management are promotion to new grade/scale and annual increments. Total number of promotions, of teaching staff from 2012-16 are eight and of non-teaching staff are four. The promotions are communicated to stakeholders via letters issued by top management, SGPC.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

Regular teaching as well as non-teaching staff is given benefits of Provident fund, Gratuity, maternity leave, earned leaves for maximum 300 days, medical leave, group insurance etc. All the staff members who retired from college were provided provident fund and gratuity. Maternity leave and medical leave is provided to all the applicants appointed on permanent basis. Regular as well as ad hoc staff is entitled to casual leaves. Fee concession is given to wards of class IV employees.

6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The good reputation of the college and top management, SGPC itself serves as attracting factor. The posts are advertised in reputed newspapers having good circulation as well as uploaded on the website of Directorate of Education, SGPC, and applications are invited. Salary is paid according to UGC norms. Pay scales are revised according to pay

commission norms. Annual increments and promotions are given. Facility of faculty house is provided to outstation faculty. Paid leaves, financial aid is also extended for qualification improvement. Last but not the least, healthy work environment is maintained to retain eminent faculty.

6.4 FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCE MOBILIZATION

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

Budget is prepared prior to the commencement of session to set up fiscal targets and level of expenditures compatible with these targets. Budget includes the following heads: 95% grant-in-aid funds, building fund, society fund and management funds. Bursar monitors the financial flow through functioning of Administrative committees related to financial matters like Amalgamated funds committee, Purchase committee, Fee concession committee, UGC affairs committee and construction committee. Quotations are invited for any purchase to be made. All the bills are scrutinized by Bursar and then are passed to accounts branch to be incorporated into expenditure heads under the supervision of Superintendent. All the payments are done through cheques.

6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

Internal audit is done by Bursar and Superintendent on routine basis as per mechanism specified in 6.4.1. To validate internal audit done by authorities of the college, there is provision of other internal audit carried out by the agency of Punjab Government 'Internal audit- Finance and Accounts' of District Faridkot. External audit is performed by two separate firms- 'Auditor General of Punjab' and CA sponsored by Central Management, SGPC. Audits are done every year and are up to date. There are no significant audit objections, minor ones are taken care of.

6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/ funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/ Corpus available with institutions, if any?

Major sources of institutional funding are fees and funds collected from students and grant-in-aid from Punjab government. Additional funding is obtained from the top management, SGPC and through UGC grants. Institute has not faced any overall financial deficit yet. Corpus fund available as on 31-03-2016 is Rs. 1,72,25,625/-.

Following are the income and expenditure statements of last four years. Audited income and expenditure reports will be provided to peer team during on site visit.

In addition to the above stated funding, institute has generated additional sources of income by constructing mini market (a shopping complex) inside the campus. Shops are lent on lease. This effort also facilitates to cater to students' daily needs. Other than this, efforts are made to approach UGC, MPs, MLAs and other eminent and affluent personalities of the town for funds.

6.5 INTERNAL QUALITY ASSURANCE SYSTEM

6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

a). Has the institution established an internal quality assurance cell (IQAC)? If yes, what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Institute has established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell with a view to improve the quality in all aspects. Quality assurance is ensured by formulation of aims and objectives, proper monitoring of activities carried out to achieve stated aims, reviewing the process after completion of task and feedback from various stakeholders. Constitution of various committees, cells and bodies is done to achieve the stated purpose. IQAC has improved the outcome in academics, sports and co-curricular activities. These outcomes altogether resulted in continuous rise in number of students admitted and improved financial state of Institute.

b). How many decisions of the IQAC has been approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented? IQAC takes decisions on the basis of feedback from all the stakeholders and are conveyed to the management through Principal. Many of the decisions taken by the IQAC have been implemented.

c). Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes, the IQAC has an external member on its committee to guide in the matters pertaining to administration and teaching-learning process.

d). How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of IQAC?

Alumni of the college serve as resource to the institute in various aspects. They give valuable suggestions and feedback for improving Institutional activities.

e). How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

IQAC has involved staff according to seniority and interest to constitute various committees, cells, societies, HODs, proctors who are involved directly in reinforcing the Quality. Communication with concerned person/body is done through meetings, telecommunication, notices, circulars and announcements through public addressing system installed in the college.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes' give detail on its operationalisation.

Yes, institute has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academics and administrative activities. All the administrative activities of the institute are headed by the Principal. Facilitation in this is provided by Principal's advisory committee constituting Vice-principal cum bursar and Dean, Academics as its members. The separate administrative committee is framed by college with senior faculty as its members who are also the part of other academic committees. It has Vice-principal cum bursar, Dean Academic Affairs, P.G Incharge, Dean, Cultural Affairs, Registrar, House Examinations,

incharge construction committee, incharge hostel, Dean, Religious Activities, Dean, Sports and Superintendent as its members.

Involvement of the members of teaching faculty in administrative activities trims the gap between Academics and administration resulting quicker communication and faster actions.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures? If 'yes' give details enumerating its impact.

Though there is no formal training provided to the staff, IQAC briefs its aims and objectives to them through orientation program organized at the commencement of the session. Besides this, faculty is facilitated to attend trainings, conferences, workshops, orientations and refresher courses organized by various universities and colleges. Faculty members are also motivated to participate in the workshops, seminars, extension lectures are organized by different departments within the Institute.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake academic audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If yes, how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

All courses are run in accordance with guidelines of UGC and Panjab University. Courses introduced in the college are properly inspected by the inspection teams of the affiliating University. Still to improve the quality, periodic academic audit is done by the Principal and Dean, Academic Affairsthrough department-wise meetings. Before commencement of new session, they review results of previous session class-wise as well as teacher wise. During the session theory and practical syllabi covered are also reviewed.

Outcome is discussed in various meetings with members of LMC and staff to improve institutional activities.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/ regulatory authorities?

IQAC ensures that internal quality is aligned to the requirements of University Grant Commission and the affiliating University.

UGC guidelines are strictly abided by in recruitment of quality faculty, establishment of various units like Anti- harassment cell, Grievance redressal cell, Carrier guidance cell etc.


Panjab University guidelines are strictly obeyed in regard to criteria of students' admission; number of students admitted per course; minimum 75% attendance; conduct of external, internal, practical exams; pass percentage in house examinations as specified by university and the number of teaching hours and total teaching days in session are in accordance with Panjab University.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching-learning process? Give details of the structure, methodologies of operations and outcomes?

Institute review teaching learning process by specific mechanisms like meetings, feed backs, examinations/assignments/ projects, continuous monitoring.

- Principal hold department wise and committee wise meetings to review the functioning of various departments and academics committees.
- Dean, Academics convene periodic academic audit and collects feedback from students.
- Intra departmental meetings are conducted by HODs.
- Proper check is kept on discipline, regularity and punctuality by monitoring through proctors and CCTV coverage.
- Agenda based tutorials are conducted fortnightly.
- Complaint and suggestion boxes are regularly checked and worked upon with great momentum.
- Subject teachers monitor regularity of students in class by compiling the fortnight attendance report.

Principal heads the meetings with Dean, Academics, HODs and Registrar to review academics. Outcome of all activities is quality teaching, excellent results and continual progress of institute. Feed backs are used to develop policies and plans.



6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

Following methods are adopted by the Institute to communicate its assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to its internal and external stakeholders:

- Orientation program is conducted at the beginning of session to convey aims and objectives of IQAC to teachers and students.
- Principal holds departmental and various committee meetings.
- Prospectus conveys the proper information regarding policies and rules of the Institute.
- College magazine is published annually under the title "Roopmani".
- Tutorials serve as important source of communication between students and their tutors, with the student tutor ratio being 40:1.

- Annual academic report containing the academic achievements of teachers and students is released on annual prize distribution function. Annual sports report is released on sports meet.
- Other means of communication include college website, notice boards, printed and electronic media, telephone, internet and post.

CRITERION- VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

The college assesses the environmental impact of the processes and the projects being carried out in the campus though not formally by any external agency. 7.1.2 contains the detail of its attempts to make not only the campus but also the students and the staff eco-friendly.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

- Energy conservation
- Use of renewable energy
- Water harvesting
- Check dam construction
- Efforts for carbon neutrality
- Plantation
- Hazardous waste management
- e-waste management
- a) For energy conservation and carbon neutrality, the staff and the students of the college make sincere and fruitful efforts. A large number of students from nearby villages come in groups using private vans or use public transport systems such as buses, e-rickshaws; local students use cycles, cycle-rickshaws; a sizeable number of the students come on foot also. In the similar manner, a significant number of members of the teaching staff, both local and outstation, resort to carpooling while some of them come on bicycle too. In total, around 30 staff members are commuting by carpooling and about 50 vans are being used by the students to travel to and from the college daily. This results in reducing not only the fuel consumption and traffic congestion but also is an effort towards carbon neutrality. Another effort in this

- direction was the cycle rally organized by the college in which the vice-principle, aged 56, along with some other teachers, led the students.
- **b**) Further, the college building is largely well-lit and hence, needs **no electric lights** on sunny days.
- c) The college makes **optimum use of renewable energy** in the form of solar geysers installed in the college hostel and faculty house.
- d) The college's efforts in the direction of **plantation** can be known from the fact that it is recognized as "Green Campus" in the city. In the total area of nearly 15 acres, there are 148 species of plants including a botanical garden and one acre of green cover in the area where electric generators have been kept. Besides, the college has a tradition of celebrating Van Mahotsav, and planting saplings during NSS camps organized in the campus. Further, the Nanhi Chhaan Cell of the college has plantation as one of its chief motives.
- e) To avoid the noise pollution, the college has managed to purchase silent power generators.
- f) To reduce waste and to prevent the health and environmental hazards of disposable thermocol and plastic ware, aluminum foil and polythene, the college has not only prohibited the use of these things within the campus but also motivates the students to spread the awareness in the society at large. In addition for bio-degradable waste, the college resorts to vermicomposting.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Keeping in view the mission and the objectives of the institution, a number of innovative practices have been introduced in the last four years. The same are as below:

Extending Financial Help to the Students:

- As a special incentive to the meritorious students irrespective of caste, creed, or
 economic status, the college has installed the provision of Mai Bhago Stipend in
 which the students avail fee concessions according the percentage of the marks
 they secure in university examinations.
- From university merit holders, the college charges only university and DPI funds.
- For financially weak students, the college has initiated the special provision of payment of college fee in installments.
- Since the college is situated in the Malwa region of the Punjab, notorious as cancer belt, it has set up a provision for securing financial aid from the management for the students diagnosed with cancer.

For Academic and Skill Enhancement:

- In an attempt to enhance learning outcomes, the Department of English has started for the students the screening of films on the stories, dramas or novels prescribed in their coursework.
- As the college is situated in a remote region of the Punjab where the majority of the students come from rural background not well-versed in the language of English, teaching English literature generally remains a task for the teachers. To resolve the problem, our Department of English has encouraged the students to enact the dramas prescribed in their syllabus. The first attempt in this direction was the enactment of the play *Refund* from B.A. 2nd Semester Elective English syllabus by the students of Functional English and Elective English.
- The Department of Mathematics and Business Administration jointly have started organizing a workshop for preparing the students for various competitive and entrance tests such as conducted by different banks, Staff Selection Commissions, Public Service Commissions, and UGC.
- As a first in the college, the Department of Mathematics has created three different groups on the social site Whatsapp—for its UG and PG students, and for its alumni. Through these groups, the department not only provides its students

with e-material related with their coursework, but also circulates the information regarding the seminars, conferences, or workshop being organized in the region. The result of this effort is as below:

- Seven students and four alumni of the department participated in an international workshop on *Contribution of Women in Mathematics* at Punjabi University, Patiala, on February 6-7, 2017.
- Ms. Tanveer Bansal, a student of M.sc.(Mathematics) 4th semester, presented a paper in an international conference on *Innovative Trends in Mathematics, Computer and Information Science* at M. M. University, Mulana, Ambala, Haryana, on March 9-10, 2017.

For Support Staff:

- In an attempt to be supportive to its support staff (peons, sweepers, gardeners, gatekeepers, security guards), the college has established a provision of advance salary with sweets on the occasions of festivals like Deepavali, Lohri, Raksha Bandhan etc. In addition, they are also provided with two uniforms—summer and winter—every year by the college.
- The teaching staff of the college also contributes in lending a helping hand when some member from the non-teaching or the support staff is in need of monetary assistance for one reason or the other. During the last years, the teachers have pooled resources to defray the medical bills of one of our clerical staff, one of our maintenance staff, and one of our hostel staff.

For Promoting the Values of Good Citizenship among Students:

• Keeping in view the ensuing General Elections to Punjab Legislative Assembly on 04 February, 2017, 7th National Voters' Day was celebrated by English Literary society on 25 January, 2017. Focusing on the first time voters, the event was an attempt to exhort the students to use their voting rights actively. It included discussions on the history of universal adult franchise, voting rights to

- women, significance of voting in a democracy, and the working of EVMs and VVPATs. The members of the society came out with *jaago*, poem recitations, and paper presentations to make the presence alive to the need of judicious voting.
- As a follow-up of the National Voters' Day celebration, English Literary Society
 undertook a poll survey, first of its kind, in the college campus after the above
 mentioned elections. The survey report revealed that more than 90% of eligible
 voters among the students used their voting right in the elections to contribute to
 the formation of the state government.

For Better Governance and Infrastructure:

- As the institution is spread in a large area of nearly 15 acres, CCTV cameras at key places in the campus have been installed for better discipline and governance.
- As the ground water of the region is not potable, R.O. systems have been installed in the campus.

For Sensitizing the Students Towards Health and Heritage:

• To motivate the youth to utilise their free time in a healthy way to acquaint them with the folk games played in the streets in the Punjab in pre-IT era, the Department of English organised an event titled *Reliving Street Games* on March 08, 2017. It included the Punjabi folk games like *stapu*, geete, skipping, *additappa*, *anna-jhota*, *kotla-chhapaki*, gallery. The culmination of the event came with the international marathoner aptly titled the 'Turbaned Tornado' S. Fauja Singh running with the students and teachers on the track of Mai Bhago Sports Stadium of the college.

7.3 BEST PRACTICES

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and /or contributed to the Quality improvement of the core activities of the college.

Best Practice: 1. Striving to Keep the Cultural Heritage Alive.

Goals:

- To motivate the students to be rooted in their soil in the present age of vehement globalization.
- To channelize their energies towards the ways by which they can retain their distinct cultural identity and values.
- To direct the students towards communitarian and humanitarian living as against individualism.
- To provide the students with such opportunities as may train them to lead life in harmony— not only with humankind but also with Nature as well as with their own inner and outer self.
- To guide the students so as to make them assimilate the humanitarian philosophy (maanas ki jaat sabai ekai pahachanbo; sarbat daa bhalaa) of their religion.

The Context

In face of the contemporary rage of globalization and homogenization, local cultural ways and values of living are losing their recognition and so, existence. The situation demands educational institutions to take the responsibility of preserving and carrying the rich cultural heritage of the community further for the posterity. The significance of being rooted in one's culture become greater with the fact that it is culture which gives the individuals a sense of community and belongingness; and without cultural anchoring, individuals can't grow into all-round personalities. Further, in the present era of cut-

throat commercialism, the spiritual needs of human beings generally remain unaddressed. Therefore, higher education institutions need to factor in all the aspects of cultural heritage—tangible as well as intangible.

The Practice

Taking the moral and ethical value of education as its principal quality, each regular working day in the college begins with morning prayer—"Deh Shiva bar mohe eh...", a verse by Guru Gobind Singh ji, the tenth Sikh guru, followed by national anthem. Further, to keep the students well anchored in the humanitarian philosophy of the religion and culture, the college has designated one member of its teaching faculty as Dean, Religious Affairs, and has formed Gurmat Sabha, a student association to organize the activities focusing on the values of good citizenship and ethical behaviour. In addition, a sizable number of students in the campus go for various courses and tests having the same targets. For conducting these, the college collaborates with Dharam Prachar Committee, SGPC; Guru Gobind Singh Study Circle, Muktsar; and Sikh Missionary College, Ludhiana.

Furthermore, every year to mark the commencement of new academic session, and the birthday of Guru Nanak Dev ji, *akhand path* of Guru Granth Sahib followed by *langar* is organized. The event is managed wholly by the student volunteers which keeps them in a firm touch with their culture, and simultaneously trains them to work in team and to serve others before being served.

Living in harmony with Nature is another feature of our cultural heritage. Guru Nanak Dev ji, whose philosophy the college strives to follow, has proclaimed air the teacher, water the father, and earth the mother ("Pawan guru, pani pita, mata dharat mahat..."). Therefore, among other efforts for green environment, the college is making steady efforts to set, in this semi-arid zone, an example of green region with a wide variety of plants. As a result of such efforts during the last four years, there are 148 species of plants in the college with the diversity of 31 species of trees, 24 of shrubs and small trees,

48 of herbs and potted plants, 22 of annuals and flowering plants, 4 of gymnosperms, 2 of ferns, and 17 species of weeds.

To keep the tradition of folk festivals going, the festivals of *Teej*, *Lohri*, Basant, and Holi are celebrated in the campus every year. The college has a team of traditional Sikh martial art *Gattka* and trained singers in *vaar* and *kwishari* (genres in heroic poetry). Another effort to preserve the memory of the tangible culture of the region has been by the Department of Punjabi. The department is maintaining a museum to showcase the household and agricultural articles used in the pre-industrial Punjab.

Evidence of Success

The students and also the alumni of the college find the practice of morning prayer spiritually strengthening. The passionate appreciation of this practice comes from the teachers also as some of the teachers, besides those in Music, are a part of the chorus reciting the morning prayer on the public address system. The success of the activities related with the moral and ethical aspects can be surmised from the fact that in the last four years, in each of the courses/tests mentioned above, the number of scholarship winners and merit holders has gone up. In the same manner, the enthusiastic as well as efficient involvement of the students in the organization of religious events like *akhand path*, *langar*, and various traditional festivals is a manifestation of their assimilation of the values imparted by these activities. In *Vaar* and *Kwishari* singing and *Gattka*, the college teams have won a number of prizes in many inter-college competitions. Regarding environment also, the college's efforts have been fructified as today about 65% of its total area is under green cover including trees, flower beds and grassy lawns (besides 690 potted plants), while for the Punjab the figure is 3.07% and for the district of Muktsar, it is less than 1%.

Problems Encountered and Resources required

In organizing all the activities, the foremost requirement is of arranging funds as the infrastructure and human resources required can be arranged with the finances only. The range and quality of the pursuits can be certainly enhanced if there is more money available. Further, near about two-thirds of the college students come from nearby villages and they commute in groups by vans which leave the college at 3:00 pm after the classes are over. Therefore, though once motivated, the students enthusiastically take part in the activities, problems are encountered in scheduling the practice sessions within their free periods. The task of procuring various articles for Punjabi heritage museum and maintaining the same also have spatial, monetary, and human resources requirements.

A social hindrance—when girls are got married in the middle of their academic course and forced to leave the studies, the financial help provided to them simply go fruitless.

Strengths: Well Qualified and experienced staff, Interest of students in various departmental activities, ICT enabled classroom., Wi -fi campus, Practicals class to enrich students Technically

Opportunities: Student placement in Corporate sector, Self Employment, Govt. Sector like Civil Services, computer operator, banking, teaching.

Weakness: Backward Area as the course is technical and in English medium

Challenges: Language barrier for the students of Rural Area, Exploitation in private Sector, High cost of Sofwares /Hardware

POST-ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The first NAAC accreditation of the college was in 2009. The peer team appreciated the physical infrastructure and harmonious atmosphere conducive to academic pursuits, the financially sound management, effective teaching-learning process and overall academic excellence of the college. However, the team made certain observations as enhancement measures. The college, since then, has been making steady efforts in the direction of the suggestions.

A. INITIATIVES TAKEN ON RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PEER TEAM:

Recommendations on Academics: Introduction of need based and professional courses at UG, PG level, skill based, and short term courses.

Steps taken:

The institute offered only nine academic programmes till 2009. After that, four new UG courses, B. Sc (Non Medical), B.Sc. (Medical), B. Sc (Computer Science), B.Sc. (Fashion Designing), were introduced. Apart from this, four PG courses, M.A. (Punjabi), M.A. (Sociology), M.Sc. (Mathematics), and M.Com were also introduced in a phased manner. The college has started M. Sc. (Fashion Designing) from the session 2016-17 and purposes to start M. Sc. (Physics) from the session 2017-18. The college has also started two more skill based Add On courses (Certificate, Diploma and Advanced diploma courses) in Information Technology and Communicative English, and five short term courses in Printing and Dying, Art and Craft, English Speaking, Basics of Computer and Internet, and Mathematics for Competitive exams.

Recommendation on research and extension activities: The conduct of seminars, workshops, field-visits, training courses and taking up research projects.

Steps taken:

Research and Seminar Committee acts as a facilitator for the faculty research by circulating the information regarding various seminars/conferences/workshops being organized in the region and by providing the details of the funding agencies in different research areas. The college faculty has been active in research of paper presentations, publication of research papers/books and taking up minor/major research projects. Presently, 16 of the faculty members have completed their doctoral research, 27 are M. Phil. while 10 are pursuing Ph.D. In the last four years, there has been a spectacular increase in the number of publications. Total number of publication is 12 Books, 04 edited Books, 23 chapters in books, 62 research papers in peer reviewed journals, 33 in SCOPUS and 63 in proceedings with ISSN and 47 in others. 131 research papers, articles have been presented at international national seminar / conference / workshops. A total number of 54 UGC/ICSSR sponsored seminars/conferences have been organized on a wide range of issues and concerns.

The college received and spent a grant of Rs. 5,50,000/- from ICSSR for organizing a ten day research methodology workshop. UGC sanctioned three minor research projects have been completed and two major collaborative research projects are going on. Further, in the last four years, 40 members from the teaching staff of the college have taken the benefit of various faculty development programmes such as orientation courses, refresher courses, winter/summer schools, and workshops on different subjects sponsored by UGC or other agencies.

Student-centric teaching techniques like group discussion, power point presentations, seminars, invited talks and ru-b-ru programmes, field visits etc. are adopted to augment the learning process. Experts are invited for special lectures from other institutions and universities. Modern teaching aids and tools like computer systems, internet and other materials are used to facilitate the e-teaching learning. Field visits to fisheries, Botanical garden, Historical/Religious places, industries, Science city, TV stations, Newspaper

offices/Printing Press etc. supplement the teaching learning to give first hand experiences. College has developed linkages with industries for programmes like BBA, B.Com and Fashion designing, M.sc (IT) to acquire HR Skills, and Digital and Cooperative Marketing Skills.

The college plans and organizes extension and outreach programmes through NCC, NSS, various cells and clubs as well as through different departmental societies with the objective of making the learning of its students a holistic experience bringing the academic, community, and environmental aspects together. These programmes play a significant role in sensitizing the students to the needs of the community and the environment and inculcate in them the qualities of a good. For instance, a cycle rally organized by the college aimed at sensitizing the students as well as the society to the benefits of cycling for better environment, safe roads and good health. In an awareness campaign 'Polythene Free Campus' students took pledge not to use polythene bags not only in the campus but also in their routine life. Under vermicomposting project initiated by the department of basic Sciences, residents of village khunan Kalan were given a presentation explaining the process and benefits of vermicomposting by the students and the teachers.

Recommendation on Infrastructure and Learning resources: College has spent huge money for augmenting its infrastructure in the form of extension of building, addition of new laboratories, enrichment and automation of library, acquisition of latest equipment and up gradation of existing ICT facilities.

Considering the wide range of career options offered by the institution, library facilities have been improved to a large extent. At present, there are 25,000 (approx.) books and 61 periodicals in the library. The college has been subscribing to online journals through the facility of INFLIBNET to promote research among the faculty and students. Every year, college spends a considerable amount for purchasing books and subscription of journals. Regular updating of Periodicals, newspapers, journals and magazines in the library are updated regularly so as to provide the students with latest study material.

College has 20 laboratories for Science, Fashion designing, Biotechnology, Computer, Geography, Home science, Language and Music subjects. All laboratories are equipped with latest equipments, benches and cupboards for easy handling of articles, storage spaces for equipments and chemicals and attendants to instruct and monitor the student's activities. Instruments are calibrated and repaired regularly and Computer and language laboratories have been upgraded. In the last five years, Science and Fashion Designing laboratories have been established. The campus has Wi-Fi internet facility to enrich the knowledge of teachers and students.

For Outdoor and indoor games the institute has 400m track for track and field events, play grounds for Volleyball, Hockey, Football, Hand ball, Badminton, Kho kho, Kabbadi and Gatka (Sikh martial art). Along the periphery of the ground there are cemented stand have been constructed for seating of students. Mai Bhago stadium building also has one multipurpose hall for indoor games like Taekwondo, Judo, Table Tennis, Boxing and Kabbadi (National style). Gymnasium is furnished with twister, leg and arm curling machine, bench press, treadmill and multipurpose mats. Gurudwara Sahib and a common room for students is under future plan.

The college has an registered Alumni Association, registered under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 under registration no 5979. It is functioning under the charge of a Dean. The College has a number of illustrious alumni who have made a significant contribution in various fields and act as role models and leave an indelible mark on the young scholars whenever they visit the institution. The Alumni Association maintains cordial relationship between the College and Alumni. It gives due importance to alumni's feedback on various academic, infrastructural and co-curricular activities. Some of the distinguished alumni are the members of IQAC and they significantly contribute in the quality growth of the college.

The college has set up a "Centre for the Coaching of Competitive Exams" for the students. This center has its own library enriched with good books and journals related to

various competitive exams. Every year a number of students appear for competitive exams and many achieves good scores.

Recommendation: IQAC to be strengthened

Steps taken: IQAC is constantly involved in sustaining and enhancing the quality not only of curricular and co-curricular activities in the campus but also maintains a record of the progress of the faculty and the students. The suggestions and recommendations put forward in the meetings of the Cell are conveyed, through the Principal, to the Managing Committee for approval and implementation.

B. INITIATIVES TAKEN FOR QUALITY ENHANCEMENT:

As per the suggestions of the Peer team, the college has taken numerous steps to improve the teaching learning process. College had only 36 faculty members on pay roll in 2009, but at present college has 81 faculty members with 16 Ph. D, 27 M. Phil, 19 PG+NET, and 10 are pursuing Ph. D. There is an increase of 55 % in the number of faculty members from the accreditation of Cycle-I.

The college is committed to provide the students every possible help and support they need in their pursuit to become worthy citizens of the society. As stated earlier, the college was set up with a mission of imparting holistic education to the women folk. It has formally set up an office of Dean Student's Welfare which guides and assists students requiring financial support in the form of fee concession and scholarships from the college and government funding agencies.

During Last Four Years, Institute has provided Rs.1,23,12,868 as financial assistance to the students and Rs. 4,59,08,901 from State/ Central Government & Other Agencies. In the financial year (2015-16) 85.6 % of SC students were provided free education under the *Ashirwad Scheme* of the government of Punjab. All the students are covered under the Students Safety Insurance Policy (No.200181) of United India Insurance Company Limited. In case of any mishap, during the college hours, they will get the compensation as per rules.

To promote moral and ethical values among the students, college has designated a faculty member as Dean, Religious Affairs and has established a cell *Gurmat Sabha* who conducts various religion related programmes. Every year it carries out many activities to root students and staff to their traditions and values. It also facilitates conduct of 2 years correspondence course '*Naitik sikhya*' (Moral Education) and 03 other religion based examinations by *Dharm Parchar Committee* of SGPC, based on which scholarships are awarded to the eligible students.

The College has two NCC units of 52 cadets each aimed to create human resource of organized, trained and motivated youth, to provide leadership in all walks of life and always be available for the service of the nation. Two units of N.S.S. comprising of 110 volunteers have been functional in the college.




